Ben Wade has been making a speech the mulattoes of San Domingo, Its point was to persuade the "culled folks" to come under the American flag : "for" said he, "your government is unable to protect the citizens in all their rights in the tumults which arise, the people are dragged into controversies in which they have little interest, and over which they have no control. Leaders spring up, and for their own personal ends enkindle strife, wage war against their neighbors, rob the inoffensive, and force the citizens from their homes." That is a fair picture of negro government everywhere. Yet it is supposed by Grant & Co. that such people, who are unable to govern themselves, will make an admirable political element. to help us whites govern ourselves.

REVOLTING OUTRAGE.

Sunday before last, being the anniver sary of the Proclamation of the Republic of 1848, the Reds of Paris held a mass meeting on the Place de la Bastile. A dispatch says the demonstration was dis orderly, and terminated in a scene of revolting atrocity. A police agent, who attempted to interfere, was seized by the crowd, fastened to a plank and thrown into the Seine, where, after struggling some time, he was drowned. As long as lie could be seen above the surface he was pelted with stones by the crowd on the quay. A magistrate, who attempted to save the unfortunate man, was threatened with the same treatment, and was finally obliged to fly for his life:

HOMEOPATHIC DOCTORS.

The homoopathic physicians of the country are very indignant at the action of the Commissioner of Pensions in dismissing all pension surgeons, who believe in the efficacy of infinitesimal doses, and adhere to the doctrine of "Similia simili bus curantur." A large delegation of doc tors, representing many different homepathic medical societies, recently went to Washington and called upon the President for redress in the matter. SOUTH AMERICA IN SUPPORT OF THE POPE.

By correspondence from Guayaquil we learn that President Moreno, of Ecuador, has forwarded to Florence an official protest against the action of King Victor Emmanuel towards the Pope. The paper is couched in the most decisive words of devoted zeal to the Chair of Peter. The early missionary labors of Pio Nono in Peru have endeared him personally to the South American peoples, independent of his position as Head of the Church.

MISSOURI POLITICS.

Senator Schurz has written a letter to a friend in Missouri, in which he opposes the proposition to call a convention toamend the State constitution. He thinks the people of Missouri are too unsettled politically at present to have a fair idea of what they need, but recommends that a committee of the Legislaiure be appointed to frame such amendments as are desirable for consideration.

THE SOUTHERN PACIFIC RAIL WAY BILL.

The opposition in the Senate to the House modification bill is so great that it is feared by its friends that the measure will be lost. The bill as it now stands, with the branches cut off, provides a grant of thirt en millions of acres of public lands. It is believed that all land grant, steamship and telegraph subsidy schemes will fail in the House.

Scones Outside Paris.

A foreign paper of recent date contains the following graphic account of the scenes around Paris. Its correspondent

"To-day I have ridden balf around Paris. Lagny is swarming with German tradesmen, hungry for business when once they can get into Paris, which is not yet allowed. Every road is thronged with Paris, pouring out of the city in which they have so long been immured. You see sad sights at every step. Families gazing hopelessly at their shattered homes, or woown house wherein to shelter their chilvisiting their own chateau, asked as a guest by the German occupants to immediately at drink a glass of his own wine, and proffered a shake-down in one of his own bedrooms. I have seen delicate ladies, with jewels on their fingers, grubbing in the fields for frosted vegetables, while the nursemaid stood in the rear with the sobbing children, and the father moved about picking up scraps of firewood to warm the damp hearth in the wrecked chuteau. Thave seen the stupefied farmer gazing dreamily on the battery

emplacements cumbering his fields, and at the shell-craters behidd them, as if the solid winks were spectral apparations and would melt away and leave the easy would melt away and leave the easy furrows, if he only looked long enough. Faces have passed me not good to look upon. Dark faces of French ladies inside carriages, with tightened muscles, and eyes flashing full of silent passion, the German sentry stopped them in the ruined village, in the rough Tenton manner, and demanded their papers. There were lurid faces of men, too, with knitted brows and suppressed angry despair working in each feature. Yet the picture has its other side, thanks to French adaptability and light heartedness. A adaptability and light heartedness. A family finds its wine shop empty, and the roof off. In a couple of hours things are patched up somewhat; the buried bottles are unearthed; and a brisk trade over the counter is going on. Another family turns up in an omnibus, with impediments, including an assortment of babies and green umbrellas, only to find its home tenanted by Saxon soldiers. Pack closer is the order with the Tentons. Room is made for the new-comers. The corporal takes the baby, while the mother tries what Erbswurst soop is like; and the old house hold settles down into something marvelously like content. The non-descript appearance of the French emigres is ing time-keeping. almost ludicrous. Some come out array. ed in the pink of sporting attire; others in dress coats. I met a young man on a velocipede."
