Sunday's Telegrams Condensed.

The cotton movement at New York for the week shows a continued falling off in receipts although the total is still very large and indicates a crop greater in extent than general estimates. In contradistinction to the decrease in receipts this week there is a very large in-crease in exports and the total shipments to Great Britain and the continent are the largest for any week this season. The great accumu-lation of cotton at the seaports and interior towns, notwithstanding the enormous increase in exports over last year, has completely de-moralized trade and caused a marked depres-sion in all quarters. The decline in the price of cotton for the week on the value of the total crop represents a shrinkage of about thirteen millions of dollars. The great difficulty with the cotton trade is that speculators have been overtrading on the advent of peace in Europe, and hence when peace is declared the warket takes a sudden plunge downward. To great bulk of speculators were fortified against peace by having a large amount of cotton on hand, and as soon as peace came some of them started to realize, which was the commencement of the present depressed condition of affairs. In plain terms there was too much company on the bull side of the market. Recelpts at all ports for the week 126,935 bales, against 136,661 last week; total receipts since September 2,917,616, against 2,189,513 the same time last year. Exports from all ports for the week 141,878 bales, against 54,522 the same week last year; total exports for the expired portion of the year 1,848,306, against 1,228,014 the same time last year. Stock at all ports 659,708 bales, against 568,764 last year; stock at interior town 123,285, against 101,384 last year; stock at Liverpool 764,000, against 292,000 last year. Amount of American cotton afloat for Great Britain 294,000 bales, against 286,000 last year. Amount of India cotton affoat for Europe 659,708 bales, against 568,764 last year.
