The following is a synopsis of the weather reports for the past 24 hours:

The pressure has risen on the East Atlantic and clear weather and fresh easterly winds generally prevail. The barometer has rapidly fallen but is still high on the Middle Atlantic, where high clouds are now appearing. Fair weather and a falling barometer have prevailed on Lake Ontario. The barometer is quite low from Lake Erie to Nebraska and from Wisconsin to Tennessee, with threatening weather and increasing fresh winds. The central area of the lowest pressure is apparently moving toward the southeast, but extending its influence on the lakes. Cloudy weather is reported from the Rocky Mountain stations.

Threatening weather is indicated for Wednesday in the Gulf and Southern States, and stormy weather in the Ohio Valley and on the lakes. There is no secure basis for further probabilities.

The Work House.  
Mr. S. Yankins, Superintendent of the County Work House, reports that he has received 158 prisoners from the Special Court for the period commencing on the 1st of June and ending with the 1st of March. Of this number only six were whites. He reports no deaths among his prisoners during that time, and only two escapes. The Work House must be a healthy as well as a useful institution, if we may judge from this report.

A Sad Case.  
Fannie Powell, a small and neatly-dressed white girl, about 15 years of age, was arrested and taken to the Guard House, yesterday afternoon, on the charge of stealing a quantity of bed clothing from the family with which she lived. She stated that she was originally from Lumberton and that her father and mother were both dead. We hope the authorities will deal as leniently as possible with the poor creature—remembering that she is a friendless orphan, with no one to lead her in the path of duty.

The Guard House.  
Under the superintendence of Alderman Howe, a very needed improvement was commenced yesterday in the Guard House. The flooring and, in fact, all the interior structure in the room appropriated to the use of prisoners was perfectly rotten, and the cells in a decayed condition. These have all been removed and a thorough overhauling will be had. From a personal inspection, we know that the guard-room was in a miserable condition and are glad to see that it is being put in proper order.

The Concert Friday Night.  
Our readers should bear in mind the "Evening of Sacred Songs" to which they are to be treated by the great author and composer, Philip Phillips, at Front street, M. E. Church on Friday night. We publish the following at the request of the Superintendent:  
WILMINGTON, N. C., March 7th, 1871.

In reply to complaints made in Pee Dee Herald as to management at head of W. C. & R. R. R., the Agent, Mr. Long, states as follows:

First: As to Mr. P. N. Smith's line. The wagoner sent, having no order, not being able to state how it was marked or by whom shipped, and in fact not knowing anything about them at all, the Agent very naturally refused to allow them to be carried away.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.

We make up the following summary of the proceedings of the Legislature from the report in the Sentinel.

SENATE.

MONDAY MORNING, March 7.  
On motion of Mr. Edwards, the bill removing the courthouse from Halifax town to Edfield, in Halifax county, was taken up. (It submits the proposition to the people in twenty days after passage of the bill.)

Eppes, colored, presented a petition from citizens of Halifax town praying that the bill should not pass.

Mr. Edwards presented a petition from other citizens of Halifax county, asking that the bill be passed.

Eppes, colored, spoke against the bill. Mr. Edwards stated that the proposition would be submitted to the people.

Mr. Graham of Alamance, an amendment that citizens owning property in town of Halifax should be paid the amount of depreciation of such property occasioned by such removal of the courthouse. Provide for the appointment of five Commissioners to assess damages, &c.

Mr. Merrimon called the previous question, which was sustained.

Amendment of Mr. Graham, adopted. Bill failed to pass its second reading, yeas 30.

Mr. Graham of Alamance, a bill to protect bona fide purchasers of lands sold by Sheriff for taxes in 1868, referred.

Mr. Cook, a bill to amend the Public Laws of 1869, relative to children becoming of age selecting guardians, referred.

Mr. Flemming, a bill to restore the credit of North Carolina by providing for payment of State debt, referred.

Mr. Troy, a resolution to print the original resolutions of impeachment, lies over.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES.

Monday, March 6th, 1871.  
Messrs. Justice, Withers and McClure were announced as the Special Committee to investigate the charges against W. Jones, Judge of the 2nd Judicial District.

By Mr. Strudwick: A bill to amend the act to provide for the collection of taxes; referred.

CALENDAR.

A resolution to appoint a joint committee to report a bill establishing three terms of the Supreme Court each year was taken up.

On motion of Mr. Robinson, the resolution was indefinitely postponed.

SPECIAL ORDER.

An act to abolish the office of State Geologist, was taken up.

On motion of Mr. French, the bill was laid on the table.

The second Special Order, being a bill providing for the office of Assistant State Geologist, to operate in the western counties only, was taken up.

Mr. Robinson offered an amendment appointing C. D. Smith, of Macon county, as the assistant; also to strike out in bill, the words "Western Counties" and insert "The 6th and 7th Congressional Districts." The amendments offered by Mr. Robinson were adopted.

Mr. Robinson offered an amendment allowing an additional sum of \$1000 for the State survey.

After some debate, the amendment of Mr. Robinson was put to a vote and rejected.

Mr. Withers offered a proviso to the bill which provides in lieu of the \$5000 now appropriated for geological purposes, that the Geologist shall receive a salary of \$2000 a year and his assistant \$1000.

After a long debate, the yeas and nays were called and the amendment of Mr. Withers was adopted by a vote of yeas 29, nays 29.

The yeas and nays were called, and the bill passed its second reading by a vote of yeas 43, nays 28.

HIGH COURT OF IMPROVEMENT.

Monday, March 6.  
Chief Justice Pearson appeared, at 11, A. M., and took the Chair.

James E. Boyd commenced on Saturday, but nothing of importance was elicited. Several other parties were sworn and testified to being whipped by disguised men, threatened, &c.

Henry M. Ray sworn: I am 41 years old and live in Alamance; on the 19th of February, 1870, I saw ten or twelve disguised men at Alex. Ruffin's; they called my brother in law to the gate; they were mounted on horses covered up; men in white, all but one, who was in black; next morning we took the back track of the horses, went over to Overman's, a witness here, who had been whipped; I gave the Governor information that civil law was powerless, and invoked the interposition of the military; outrages were numberless and none punished; and with information from parties I had conversed with that they were not punished; I saw the Governor several times; he asked my advice; I told him to consult with his counsel; I am a member of the Union League; I have a copy of its by-laws with me; (it is handed to counsel who put it in as evidence); the League met day and night; there was no instruction for parade; no burn-burning was enjoined by the League. (Defence insist on the reading of the pamphlet, which Clerk commenced.)

Mr. Robbins, of Rowan, moved that it all be printed in the appendix, or such portions as are put in. Adopted.

No Union Leaguer authorized to go disguised; I belonged to the Heroes of America; (ritual handed witness, he seemed to know very little about it; recollects when he was initiated, but that's about all); the Leagues were introduced in Alamance about the Spring of 1867; I did not introduce them; don't know who did; I know the Leagues have been charged with burn-burning; the League never censured any one for burn-burning; I was in the Convention of 1868; I left the Confederacy in March 1864; I was drafted in 1852; and hired a substitute; I never received a copper for being a spy for the government; in March, April or May, I was appointed captain, to raise a company of detailed militia; Governor, when Kirk came, ordered me to report to Kirk; I went from Kirk to Raleigh once or twice; I was subject to orders; Bergen ordered me to go with his men in southern part of the county, making arrests; I went; I didn't suggest the name of any one; I went along to show the way; I was to be one of the military court; I was appointed colonel; Red Eye was to be one of them; I can't say positively that the Governor told me this; I got \$3 per day for my going round; Mr. Neathery paid me for services; I was a justice of the peace in 1868; never refused to grant warrants to anybody; I know of no case where warrants were refused on application; not one; the courts were regularly held, up to the time of the coming of Kirk; court was held in June; Kirk came in July; at this very term I know a man was tried and condemned to be hanged; also parties sent to the penitentiary; the clerk's office was closed; but said the reason was because the county had been declared in insurrection; A. G. Moore the next evening after the federal troops came said that "five sons of bitches had betrayed the hanging of Onlaw;" and Maj. Patterson said "well, they'll go up yet;" this was in the Superior Court Clerk's office; Moore threatened me at this time, and was pulling his coat to fight me; but Patterson pulled him on the arm, and made him desist; he charged me with informing the Governor about matters there, and I had done it; I know of no resistance to the law; Wm. A. Albright is the Clerk; he signed the application for troops to the Governor, and the reason was because we thought outrages could not be stopped. The Solicitor was a Republican; I know of no false verdict; I know of no Constable or Sheriff who failed to execute any process; the Governor told me that the county of Alamance was declared in a state of insurrection, for the hanging of Wyatt Outlaw, near the Court House, and other outrages in the county; Moore and Badham had a fight in regard to the letter mentioned, and Badham was laid up for some time—a month probably.

Court adjourned at 2:30, P. M.
