and northwesterly winds in the East. The low

moved eastward, preceded by high southeasterly winds on Lake Michigan and fresh winds
on Lake Erie, with threatening weather from
the Gulf to Lake Ontario, and rain on Lakes
Erie and Michigan. The barometer is rising
with brisk northerly winds at the Rocky with brisk northerly winds at the Rocky Mountain stations, and is high on the Pacific coast. The temperature has disen very rapidly from Iowa to South Carolina.

Tells of his attending the meeting in Yanceyville; brother was taking notes in the meeting; I saw him go out with Mr. Wiley; I never saw him come back; it was about 4 o'clock on the 21st of May, 1870; I went out 20 minutes afterwards; went ever to Mr. Groom's house; set there till 5 p. m., when I went to his house, where I found his wife very uneasy; she expected him at 4 p. m.; she had sent up town after him, but couldn't find him; I then went up myself with my brother, about sunset; made inquiries for him; went round the court house; finally we concluded to send to Dr. Roan, a commissioner, for keys to the court house; we searched the entire court house, except one room, which Dr. Roan said was never open, and he did not have the key; Dr. Roan sent his son Robert for the key, but returned, saying he couldn't find it; we then went on the outside, and looked in with a light but saw nothing but a pile of wood; some twenty of us remained in the court house all night, till next morning; George Rowe, a colored man, saw the body of my brother from the window; he had a rope round his neck; considerable blood on the floor. [Managers object to so much details in this matter as irrelevant, and the Chief Justice sustained them. Sam Patterson and Joe Womack, both colored, were whipped; also Jones (mentioned half a dozen times) whipped; Patterson is now in Danville, Womack in Tennessee; in the spring I considered feeling between the two parties very bad; I know of no punishment for crimes spoken of; John W. 
