ENGLAND'S ATTITUDE IN THE PEACE NEGOTIATIONS.

Certain diplomatic correspondence is published which shows the part taken by England in the negotiations for peace at Versailles. Broglie, who arrived in London on the 24th ultimo, addressed a note to the Foreign Office complaining of the indifference exhibited by England towards France, and asking Granville to obtain a prolongation of the armistice and a reduction of the indemnity from the onerous pecuniary exaction.

DEMOCRATIC GAINS IN NEW YORK.

The New York World says: "The result of the municipal elections in the interior of the State yesterday is generally favorable to the Democracy. The gains are handsome, and Troy leads off with 2,000 majority for the Democratic candidate for Mayor—a gain of over 1,000 over Governor Hoffman's majority last November."

THE WILD HUNT FOR OFFICE.

The Washington Patriot says the scramble for office was never before so disgraceful as at the present time, and among the most ardent seekers after place are Senators and Representatives whose terms expired on the 4th instant. There is quite a list of these gentlemen, nearly all of whom expect the President to provide for them. Most of them are anxious to go abroad and as a consequence, several recalls of persons now deeming themselves secure are expected. The fact that these persons have been repudiated at home does not seem to have any weight or effect.

SPAIN.

The foreign monarchy party in Spain claim a sure majority in the coming elections for members of the Cortes. With the army in their pay, and all the young men disfranchised, a victory for the party in power may reasonably be expected. But what will such a victory bring with it? Peace and progress for Spain, or disquietude, tumult and discontent? Most likely the latter. The Spaniards are a proud, jealous people, and will not rest content while a foreign Prince sits in the seat of supreme power in Madrid.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The President on Wednesday decided to nominate Mr. Bancroft as minister to the new German Empire under the law just passed. Judge Orth, ex-Congressman, was assured that he would receive this position, but was in turn tendered the mission to Brazil, which Mr. Blow, of Missouri, has just resigned and which Mr. Orth promptly declined, leaving at once for his home in Indiana.

The Tornado in the West—A Account of the Damages Sustained.

The losses in East St. Louis by the tornado on Wednesday night were much exaggerated. A more careful estimate places them at about the following figures: The elevator, \$15,000; the Ferry Company, \$10,000; the St. Louis and Vandalia railroad, between \$30,000 and \$40,000; the Northwestern road, \$15,000; the Chicago and Alton, \$50,000; the Ohio and Mississippi, \$30,000; the Toledo and Wabash, between \$75,000 and \$100,000.

The steamer Mollie Able is much more injured than at first reported. She is almost stripped of her upper works, and \$30,000 would hardly repair her. The losses to citizens cannot be accurately given, but as some sixty dwelling-houses of more or less value were either destroyed or damaged, the loss can hardly be short of \$100,000. The railroad companies are busy repairing damages, and the citizens are endeavoring to gather up their houses and are collecting their furniture together. 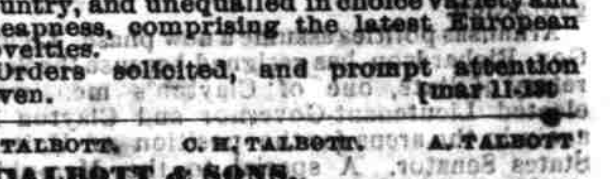
