LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY. We make up the following summary of the proceedings of the Legislature from the report in the Sentinel:

SENATE. EVENING SESSION. TUESDAY, March 13, 1871. The resolution concerning the action of Gov. Caldwell, Chief Justice Pearson and certain associate justices, introduced by Mr. Warren (heretofore published), came up as special order.

On this second reading, Mr. Olds spoke in favor of the bill, with the amendments proposed by the Senator from New Hanover.

On this third reading, Mr. Moore offered an amendment to strike out the ratifying clause, as it would then meet the views of the Senators.

On this fourth reading, Mr. Moore offered an amendment to strike out "burglary," and spoke in its favor, reading some passages from Blackstone.

On this fifth reading, Mr. Robbins of Rowan, offered an amendment relative to trials now pending for offenses committed before the passage of this act.

On this sixth reading, Mr. Graham, of Orange, called the previous question, which was sustained.
