Weather Report. WAR DEPARTMENT,

Office of Chief Signal Officer, Washington, March 17—4:35 P. M. the following is a synopsis of the weather eports for the past 24 hours :

The barometer has fallen somewhat west of lows, and heavy rains and fresh winds have atlows, and heavy rains and fresh winds have attended the eastward progress of the low barometer, which latter was this morning on Lake Ontario and is now in Omaha. Westerly and southwest winds have prevailed during the day on the lakes, with snow in the east and northwest and rain on the lower lakes. It is now clear from Lake Michigan to Florida and westward. Cloudy and rainy weather prevails from Lake Ontario to Virginia and eastward along the Atlantic. The pressure is now ward along the Atlantic. The pressure is now everywhere east of the Mississippi. The temperature has risen rapidly on the middle Atlantic and lower lakes.

It is probable that the barometer will continue low in the far west and northwest, and in the Eastern and Middle States, with fresh winds on the lakes and Atlantic coast, clearing partially. Cloudy weather is indicated for the Ohio and Mississippi valleys, with fresh winds on the Gulf, for Saturday.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY.


