#### THE DEATH PENALTY. Execution of Henderson Ozendine. FAREWELL LETTER TO HIS BROTHER

Confession of the Doomed Man IMPORTANT DISCLOSURES.

LUMBRATON, March, 17, 1871. EDITOR STAR :-Henderson Oxendine was hung to-day at 12:30 o'clock. He made no additional confession on the gallows-having previously disclosed, in private, all he knew in regard to the operations of the gang of on tlaws, of which he was doubtless the least criminal and devilish of the crowd to which he belonged. Henderson professed a willingness to go, saying that he deserved to be hung in company with the rest. This is the first execution that has occurred here since Sam was

hung for throwing overboard Capt. McDiarmid on the Cape Fear in 1858, but we trust it will not be the last, as there is a prospect of getting some more of the negro Indian robbers before long. ed to others without variation: I got out of Wilmington jail and went up to the settlement. I don't know much about how we got out—we just broke—nohody from ont-side helped us that I know of. We went to the rallroad and crossed first river over the bridge, and then took up towards South river—got across Cape Fear on a raft. We didn't get much to eat—knocked over a pig once and cooked it over fire—had no bread. It was over four weeks before we got to Seuffletown. If did not see H. B. Lowrey for a week after I got back. George, Stephen and myself got out of Wilmington jail together. Steph. got with Henry Berry before I did. I first met Henry at his own house. He and Stephen were there. I first saw Henry Berry's wife a little way from the gate, and she told me that Henry Berry and Stephen were in the house, and I went in. I have not slept in a house since I left Wilmington jail, except once or twice in Henry Berry's, and a few times in George Ap-plewhite's. The night I was captured I was at George's. 



The following farewell letter of the condemned was received by his brother, Calvin, who is now in jail in this city : LUMBERTON, N. C., March 16, 1871.

Mr. Calvin Oxendine :

MY DEAR BROTHER :- As this is the last day that I shall be allowed to live, I will drop you a few lines as one of the last acts of my life. If I had my life to live over, my brother, oh how hard I would strive to lead a better life that I might be fully prepared to meet the Saviour.

To-morrow at 2 o'clock I shall be in eterni-It is a hard and an awful death to die, but it is my fate and I must submit, trusting and believing that the God whom I now love doeth all things well, and that I shall meet Him in peace. I feel to-day that He has forgiven my many transgressions against His holy law and will at last receive me to Himself.

Oh, my brother, you know what it is to be deprived of your liberty, but you have never known, and God forbid that you will ever know, the agony I have endured for the past few days. I have in this short time lived ages, but to-morrow I trust I shall be free from all worldly troubles and enter upon an eternal rest. My poor mother sits upon one side and my sister upon the other, as I write you now. What would I give if I had lived better and spared them all this grief. Trusting to meet you in Heaven I am your affectionate brother, HENDERSON OXENDINE.

His Confession. [From the Robesonian, Extra, March 18.]

The sentence of the Court in the case of Hen rson Oxendine, convicted at the late term our Superior Court of the murder of Stephen avis, in October last, and sentenced to be nged, was executed within the enclosure of e jall yard, in this town, yesterday, at half-

The concourse of people in attendance was juite large-mostly white-and at an early nour in the morning, every house top in the icinity of the jail was crowded with eager pectators, and several persons perched them-elves upon the limbs of neighboring trees hat overlooked the gallows, and there, for wo or three hours preceding the execution, patiently sat, exposed to a drenching rain that ell through the morning. At 12:15 the prisoner was brought out of his ell accompanied by the Sheriff and Rev. Mr. Tordan. He was dressed in a neat suit of lothes contributed by the citizens of the lown, and walked with a firm and steady step to the foot of the indice ascending to the gal-lows, when he took leave of Mr. Jordan, and elimbed to the top of the ladder, and thence stepped firmiy on the platform. were eating. We knew they were hunting for us, but did not know they were on that side of the creek; if they had come up a little sooner they would have found us in the house. We were all wounded in the fight but Henry. Berry. I was shot in the arm, Steph. and George each in the side, and Boss right in the forehead, the ball glancing downward. Henry Berry, Steph. and Boss were the men that killed John Taylor—so they told me.

Tom Lowrey, or Steph, or some of them-I don't exactly remember which—told me a day or two before Taylor was killed that Henry Berry said he bed—n'd if he didn't take old Taylor off. I heard Henry Berry say that he and Boss and Steph killed him.

All the crowd were at the killing of Sanders -Henry Berry, Boss, Steph, George, myself, Tom Lowrey, Andrew Strong and Zach Mc-Lauchlin.

Tom Lowrey found where there was a bran-dy still hid in the swamp, and insisted that we at 8 should go and capture it. We went there on the Sunday. While we were there two or three bus men came up at different times and separately; as they would come in we would make them prisoners. After a while the three McNeill's came in all together, and we made them BE prisoners. We kept them all night, and next prisoners. We kept them all night, and pext (Monday) morning, early after day, Sanders came down there, and we got him. We turn-ed loose the whole crowd except Sanders. Henry Berry told them to go and to keep their mouths shut. He told McNeill that he had-caught him in three lies; he would let him go this time, but he had better behave himself. We carried Sanders off to our camp, and kept him until the following Wednesday evening. We were talking [and disputing all this time what we had better do with him. I ner the ing quin

this time what we had better do with him. told them several times, they had better let him go; but Henry Berry and Stephen swore that he should be killed. Henry Berry and Steph stack to it all the time; Sanders didn't have much to say. We would have one stan-ding guard over him at night. He said several times if we would let him go, he would go clean off and never bother us any more. He seemed vary stubborn and proud while we had him at the camp; he got a knife one time and cut a vein in his wrist so he could bleed to death but it didn't bleed a great deal-then he took arsenic-Geo. Applewhite had some in his pocket and gave it to him-he put It in his mouth and swallowed it. It didn't seem to do much-he didn't complain of pain -said one time he felt it burning in this stomach. On Wednesday evening they took him out from the camp and carried him off some distance, and then all stopped. Stephen Lowery told him that he might have an hour to pray. He prayed a good while. I felt sorry for him, and told them they had better let the man go. Henry Berry and Steph swore he shouldn't. I turned round a little and stepped off, for I saw that they were going to kill him. Just then, Steph shot one barrel of his gun into him, and he fell dead. Tom Lowery was off two or three hundred yards when Stephen killed him--Tom sorter lagged behind.

Sanders first came into the settlement as school teacher and a friend of the colored peo-ple. I hever knew Henry Berry to be with him but once. Henry Berry never went about his school-house.
