New Steamer. The new steamer Cumberland, just completed at Favetteville, made her first appearance in our waters yesterday morning, about half past 11 o'clock, her advent being announced by strains of music from the splendid band on board, which was walted upon the breezes to almost every section of the city. Boon the wharves were lined with people who were anxious to get a g'impse of the beautifu' boat whose reputation had preceded her. Quite a number of excursionists were on board, among whom were many lovely representatives of the gentler sex of our sister town. As soon as the Cumberland .came alongside of her wharf a large number of persons availed themselves of the opportunity to examine her internal arrangements. [Being among the number we are enabled to give some idea of her appointments. She is commanded by Capt. K. Phillips; is 115 feet in length over all; is 26 feet in width of deck; has 51% feet in depth of hold, which is divided into eight water-tight compartments, so that a leak in any one of the compartments will not affect the safety of the boat, the water being confined to the small space allotted to each of these compartments; she draws 22 inches of water when light, and her capacity is 800 barrels, or a out 125 tons. She has handsome cabins and state rooms, both for ladies and gentlemen, all elegantly farnished, the entrance to the state rooms for the ladies being on the inside and those for the gentlemen on the outside. In fact she is provided with every convenience that can be found on a first-class boat. Her machinery is all new and we learn from those who came down on her that it works like a charm.

The Cumberland was constructed under the immediate supervision of Mr. A. G. Black, aided by Capt. Phillips, and is pronounced one of the most substantial and safe boats on the river.

The new steamer left Fayetteville at 4 o'clock on Wednesday afternoon. Arriving at Whitehall about 9 o'clock she was tied up, when the excursionists spent a portion of the night very pleasantly in dancing to the "masle by the band.

Resuming her trip early yesterday morning, she arrived here at 11;80 o'clock, as before stated.

Those buildings in this State in which the colored Episcopalians worshipped were not exclusively devoted to that purpose; they were originally built for school houses or some secular pursuit. There are wo in Newbern, but they were originally built for school houses. The colored people in Wilmington, he said, were peculiarly blessed ; this would be their own church, and they should be grateful for the kindly aid extended them in the erection of this brick edifice by one who was not of their communion, but who deeply sympathized with them, the Hon. Mr. Hooper, of the United States House of Representatives. He enjoined them to be diligent and to be constant in their attendance upon Divine service, which was an education in it self:

The Bishop was listened to with the deepest attention and closed after expressing the belief t at the day would come when the land would be filled with these churches. He did not expect to line to see it, but there were those present who might, and solemnly exhorting all present to ever keep in mind that great day when "we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ."




