—A bill to amend the charter of the Hook and Ladder Company of Wilmington passed its second and third readings in the Senate on Tuesday.

—The Wilmington Fibre Works company commenced operations yesterday, the boom of their "battery" being distinctly heard all over the city, reminding many of the bombardment of Fort Fisher.

—The Bishop of the Diocese, with divine permission, will officiate at St. Paul's (colored Episcopal) Church, and administer the holy rite of Confirmation, on Sunday morning, March 26th.

New Steamer. The new steamer Cumberland, just completed at Fayetteville, made her first appearance in our waters yesterday morning.
