Real Estate Distribution of Memphis.

We copy the following from the Memphis Appeal:

The public is anxious to become better acquainted with the plans of the managers, we shall, in as brief space as possible, present some of the leading features. The management, in perfecting their working arrangements, require from every agent a bond to secure against the possibility of a loss in the sale of shares entrusted to them, and each agent is required to report once every week the amount of shares disposed of, so many sold, number of cash buyers and address of purchaser, all of which is transferred to the general register, so that at the time of drawing the name and residence of the holder of any fortunate share will be duly announced to the audience.

To avoid the possibility of any supposed unfairness on the part of the management in the drawing, the managers decline having anything to do with it except furnishing the appliances. They propose none but shareholders shall have any voice in selecting a committee to superintend the drawing, and that all shares unsold at that time will be placed in the hands of the committee, who will announce their numbers and total value and destroy them in the presence of the audience.

No one connected with the management will be permitted to hold a share under any consideration. With such arrangements every shareholder will have a fair chance for any of the numerous and valuable prizes. Passmore & Ruffin are well known to our citizens as honorable and candid business men, and we feel assured they would not enter upon a scheme of such magnitude unless they felt warranted thereby by the public desire to participate in the distribution.

Arrested on a Peace Warrant.

Albert Williams, colored, was arrested by Detective Carr, yesterday, on a peace warrant issued by Justice McQuigg, at the instance of one Hande Williams; and, in default of security in the sum of \$100, was committed to jail to await an examination.

The Conviction of Holden.

The Raleigh correspondent of the New York Herald, after giving the result of the impeachment trial, indulges in the following comments:
The result is as was generally anticipated, and is hailed as the harbinger of peace and quiet in the State.

Among the negroes Holden is regarded as a martyr for whom they will do anything. They congratulate the party and regard his conviction as a good riddance. It will have a happy effect in putting a stop to outrages of all sorts, whether by the Union Leaguers or the Ku Kluxers, as will, we think, inaugurate a new era in the Old North State. Ex-Governor Holden will, it is said, never return to the State, as he would be immediately saddled with a hundred suits for false imprisonment, and it would require all the friends he has in the State to keep him out of jail.

There is quite a revival among the colored Baptists of Newbern.
A fire occurred at Fort Macon last week, which destroyed the government stables.

The Battleboro' Advance says Jaybird Jones was taken off the cars at Rocky Mount beastly drunk last Saturday.

That excellent paper the Greensboro Patriot, comes to us considerably enlarged and improved. It is now the largest sheet in the State.

The United States authorities are building a large wharf at Fort Macon, in the most substantial manner, the posts being covered with metal, under water.

The Battleboro' Advance says: On the 18th inst. parties in pursuit of a thief who had stolen a horse and cart in the neighborhood of Joyner's Depot, coming up with him, he made his escape, though fired at eleven times.

The Goldsboro Messenger says: We have just learned that two white men, prisoners, made their escape from Sampson county jail on the night of the 18th inst. and that five negro prisoners escaped on the night following.

Says the Newbern Times: Rev. S. A. Stanfield, the Evangelist of Orange Presbytery for Eastern North Carolina, arrived in our city yesterday evening on the cars. He will conduct the services in the Presbyterian church to night at 7 1/2 o'clock; also on the approaching Sabbath, both in the morning and afternoon.

The Wilson Plaindealer has the following: We regret very much to hear of an accident resulting in the death of a little child, about one year old, the son of Mr. Wm. Applewhite, of this county. It seems that on Sunday night last, the child, while sleeping "behind" on a bed with a stand of the usual height, fell off, and was caught with his chin on the bedstead, between the bed and the wall, and there choked to death without being able to arouse others to its relief by its cries.

We learn from the Goldsboro Messenger that William Baker, colored, shot and killed his paramour, a mulatto woman named Bettie Moore, for infidelity, at Rocky Mount on Saturday last, and immediately thereafter blew out his own brains. They were found dead in the house shortly after the shooting. Both parties were well known among the colored people of Goldsboro.

Hillsman Morgan, colored, was arrested by Deputy Sheriff Holland, near Goldsboro, on Tuesday last, charged with a murder committed in Franklin county. A capias for his arrest was sent there by the Sheriff of Franklin, and Morgan has been taken to Franklinton. He is the same fellow, says the Goldsboro Messenger, who was with Dallas Royall the evening he assaulted Mr. James H. Privett.

The Norfolk Journal says:

The farmers of North Carolina are becoming impressed with the same idea which appears to be rapidly gaining ground among all Southern planters. During the present year they propose to plant less cotton and more corn, and have determined to devote more attention to the raising of hogs for the home supply. It is a good and promising sign to see the South thus devoting its energies to the cultivation of home supplies. With all the advantages of soil and climate in its favor it can become a great corn producing country, and while cotton may bring it wealth, corn will relieve it from that almost entire dependence upon the North and West under which it heretofore labored.
