Columbus Superior Court. The Spring term of the Superior Court for Columbus county commenced at Whiteville on Monday last, Judge Russell presiding. Two prisoners, Calvin Oxendine and Albert Sawyer, were taken from the jail in this city on Monday and carried there for trial.

The Cumberland-Excursion to Fayetteville. Left Wilmington at 5 o'clock on Friday, and was accompanied up as far as Sugar Loaf by some of Wilmington's fairest daughters; also some of the belles of Bladen; who "pitched in" and had a gay time generally.

On our return trip we left Fayetteville at 8:30, and stopped at several landings and took in freight; but the most precious freight was that which we took in at Sugar Loaf.

The case of Solomon Hill, colored, charged with the larceny of certain articles belonging to Dr. J. E. Winans, which was to have come off before Justice McQuigg yesterday, was postponed until this morning at 10 o'clock.

The Salisbury Examiner says a pretty severe hail storm passed over the Southern portion of that county last Thursday evening. Hillsman Morgan, colored, charged with a murder in Franklin county, was arrested last week at Goldsboro and sent on for trial.

The turpentine distillery of Mr. James Ellis, in Newbern, was destroyed by fire on Sunday morning last. Loss between three and four thousand dollars. No insurance.

The Raleigh Telegram says: The weather for the past few days has been rather cold for the season, and on Friday night there was considerable frost, which, it is feared, has done considerable injury to the fruit trees that are now in full bloom.

The Goldsboro Messenger says: The smoke house of Mr. DePre, near Bentonsville, Johnson county, was robbed a few nights ago, of about 100 lbs. of bacon. Mr. D. is a poor man, having lost one of his legs in the late war. Two negroes are strongly suspected of the theft.

The Charlotte Democrat says: Three fine new-style Sleeping Chair Cars have just been put on the N. C. Railroad by President Smith. For a night's ride they are preferable to the box-up Sleeping Car—more airy, more comfortable, and in case of accident a passenger can extricate himself more easily.

The Newbern Times says: On Friday night a serious effort was made to escape from jail, by Richard Payton, confined on a charge of horse stealing, and Wm. Smith, now confined on a charge of hog stealing. The effort by these rascals would, no doubt, have been successful but for the vigilance of Deputy Johnson.

Jaybird Jones Impeached. By reference to the report of the proceedings in the House yesterday, it will be seen that articles of impeachment, five in number, have been adopted against Judge Jaybird Jones. The charges are confined to the Judge's beastly drunkenness, and as this can be most readily sustained, little time will be consumed in the trial.

LEGISLATIVE SUMMARY. SENATE. MONDAY, MARCH 27, 1871. Bill in relation to the meadows in Rockingham county, passed its several readings.

Resolution authorizing the Treasurer to borrow \$200,000 was passed. Bill constituting a Board of Internal Improvements (appoints W. F. Martin, John L. Morehead, Dr. A. J. DeRosset, J. W. Graham, W. N. Willard, D. A. Davis, Ed. W. Jones and W. L. Love the Board) passed its several readings.

Mr. Merrimon obtained a suspension of the rules to take up a bill concerning the Western N. C. Railroad, and introduced a substitute, which was put upon its several readings.

Mr. Gilmer offered an amendment striking out the section allowing the sale of stock to whoever should bid without proper restrictions; adopted. Bill then passed its first and second readings.

Section first, providing that W. C. Kerr be continued pro tempore State Geologist, and shall have an assistant, C. D. Smith, Lost. Mr. Cowles moved an amendment, as a second section, that the salary, traveling, and incidental expenses of the office shall not exceed \$3,500.

Section four, fixes the salary of the Keeper of the Capitol at six hundred dollars per annum. Adopted. Section five, places the keeping of weights and measures, and the arsenal, in the hands of the Keeper of the Capitol. Bill then passed second reading. Bill put upon its third reading. Passed, 22 yeas, 9 nays.

HOUSE OF REPRESENTATIVES. MONDAY, MARCH 27, 1871. Mr. Currie presented a memorial from certain citizens of Fayetteville, praying that the bill to extend the corporate limits of that town might be passed. The memorial was referred to the appropriate committee.

The question recurred upon Mr. Wilcox's amendment striking out the provision for a transfer of \$1,000,000 of the State's stock in the N. C. R. R. Mr. Withers moved to amend by making the transfer of stock \$650,000 instead of \$1,000,000.

Mr. Withers' amendment making the transfer of Stock \$650,000 instead of \$1,000,000 was accepted. Mr. Wilcox's amendment doing away with any transfer of stock, was put to a vote and lost.

Article 1 recites the charge of drunkenness and disgraceful conduct in Raleigh. Article 2 in relation to the same thing in Goldsboro. Article 3 in relation to the same in Tarboro.

Article 4 charges the same misdemeanors in the town of Wilmington, Martin county, where he went to hold Court. Article 5 contains charges of a like nature to those in the 4th article of occurrences in Wilmington, but differing in certain particulars.
