

We learn from a correspondent at Plummerville that Sheriff McMillan with his posse and the Coroner with his jury arrived at that place yesterday. Salvage Case Decided.

In the New York Herald of the 16th we find the following decision by Judge Blatchford in the case of Heory Winsor and William D. Winsorve, the steamship Rebecca Clyde and her cargo :

The libel in this case was filed by the own-ers of the steamship Norman for themselves and on behalf of the master and crew of that vessel against the steamer Rebecca Clyde and er cargo in a case of salvage. On the 3d of January, 1870, the Norman was on a voyage from Boston to Philadelphia with a valuable cargo. At forty minutes past nine A. M. on that day, when about thirty miles east of Bar-negat, the Norman perceived the Rebecca Clyde flying a signal of distress, with the union down. She had lost her mainmast and smokestack in a h-avy gale; her machinery was disa-bled, her boiler had shifted, and her boats had been swept away. She was towed into New York by the Norman. The Court allows as salvage the sum of \$4,000. Of this sum the owners of the vessel will receive \$2,000, the master \$300, and the remaining \$1,700 is to be divided among the officers and crew, including the master, in proportion to their monthly wages, the apportionment to be made by a commissioner if required. The prayer of the answer that the Court will decree what amount the vessel and cargo will respectively pay was, as the Court understands, waived at the hearing. ford Railroad. A meeting of the Directors of this Road

was held in this city on Thursday last-Mr. Martin, President of the Road, was present and presided. The meeting was held for the purpose of consulting in regard to the proper course to raise funds to complete the Road from Wilmington to Charlotte, and from Cherryville to Rutherfordton.

The present Board, when it came into office, expected to receive from the former Board two or three hundred thousand dollars, but instead of that it found an increased debt, besides a demand from a New York man named Pickerel for money which he says he advanced to the former administration! The present Board has actually had to pay for the land on which the depot at Charlotte is built, with interest since 1859!

At the meeting last week the Board considered propositions from capitalists to advance money enough to finish the road on certain conditions. The President was authorized to proceed to New York and make such arrangements as were indicated by the Board. From what we learn we think the prospect is cheering for an early connection between Charlotte and Wilmington.

Our Rutherford contemporaries having expressed some anxiety about a rumor that the present officers of the Wil. Char. & Ruth, Railroad intended to change the location of the Road so as to divert it from Ratherlordton, the following resolution, on motion of Mr. John L. Brown of Charlotre, was upanimonsly adopted : Whereas. There seems to be an impression on the minds of some persons along the line of this Road, that the present Bourd of Directors desire or contemplate changing its original location, therefore Resolved, That this B.a.d. supposed to any change in the location of the Western Division, and earne tly desire to complete the Road to Rutherfordton at the earliest day possible .- Charlotte Democrat.


