Wilmington and Smithville Steamboat

Company. The New Board of Directors of the Wilmington and Smithville Steamboat Company met at the Purcell House last evening, when Col S. L. Fremont was elected President and Mr. T. D. Meares, Jr., Secretary and Treasurer of

the Company. The Committee, composed of competent mechanics, machinists, &c., appointed to examine the Steamer Waccamaw, reported her condition to be even better than was anticipated. In fact that, with the new boiler, which has already been ordered, and a few slight repairs on her hull, she will be a firstclass boat, staunch and perfect in every respect and especially suited to the purpose for which she is designed.

Her decks, saloons, &c., will be put in proper order and she will be furnished with awnings to protect passengers from the sun. It is proposed to have her ready to commence her regular trips by the 1st of June, but if by any unforeseen event she should not be in proper order by that time another boat will be put on temporarily in her place.

We understand that about \$2,000 is yet required by the company to meet the necessary expenses incident to the enterprise. We hope our citizens will premptly make up the amount, as it can hardly fail to be a good investment.

New lodges have been constituted in Minnesota, Vermont, North Carolina, Alabama, Mississippi, Missouri, Wisconsin, Rhode Island, St. Johns, New Brunswick, Maine and Michigan. New Grand Lodges have been organized in Iowa, New Hampshire, Rhode Island, Georgia, Louisiana and Wisconsin. He refers to the late strife in the Order, and severely criticizes the conduct of the late Grand Chancellor of Pennsylvania, and also that of the "Gr nd Lodges of Maryland and District of Columbia."

The Supreme Chancellor has received application from a body of colored men, asking for a charter, which, according to the constitution,

The Supreme Scribe, in his report, gives a full and clear account of the present condition of the Order. It exists in thirty-two States, and in New Brunswick, in the Canadian Dominion. Twenty-two States have Grand Lodges, the others being under the direct jurisdiction of the Supreme Lodge. On December 31st, 1870, there were 615 lodges, with a total membership of 58,577-an increase of
