


CLOSE ELECTIONS.

The Ku Klux Bill Not Needed. That able Republican journal, the New York Post, has some more sensible words in regard to the Ku Klux bill, and gives some irrefutable proof that it's not needed. Of thirteen Governors of Southern Statesten are Republican, one is a Conservative, and two are Democrats. We find, the writer says, that from Alabama, which has a Democratic Governor, and from Virginia which has a "Conservative" Governor, no Ko Klux outrages are reported. Tennessee, since the last election, has been quiet. Missouri, in which a special amnesty act was carried at the last election, is quiet. But, as the disorders occur in those States only which have Republican Governors, how is it that those Governors do not call upon the President, as they have the constitutional right to do? In addition to this the leading Republican papers of the country are opposed to it; and if the President should sign this bill, giving him as it does, enormous, dangerous and unconstitutional powers-and sign it in the face of the remonstrances of Southern Republicans, would he not (asks the Post) stand condemned before public opinion as grasping after the most dangerous and unconstitutional powers, and that without the shadow of an excuse, his own party in the States in which it is pretended that this



In 1839 Marcus Morton Democrat, was chosen Governor of Massachusetts by one majority. In 1840 Edward Kent, a Whig, was elected Governor in Maine by 68 votes over John Fairfield, Democrat. In 1854 Henry Clay, for President, carried Tennessee by 113 votes over James K. Polk. In 1848 Secretary Ford beat John Weller, Democrat, for Governor of Ohio, by about 250. In 1850 Horatio Seymour lost the Governor's office in New York by some 250 votes and in 1854 he was beaten again by just about the same figure.

AN IMPECUNIOUS BONAPARTE. Pierre Bonaparte, who killed Victor Noir, in Paris, lives at present on his farm in Belgium. He is said to be in such needy circumstances that he is unable to pay the mortgages on that farm. His property in Paris has been seized, by order of the courts, he not having paid to the heirs of his victim the 25,000 francs damages to which he was condemned Ly the high court which acquitted him of the criminal charge.

Suicide in Washington.

Mr. Otis S. Moulton, proprietor of a ladies' and gentlemen's saloon in Washington, committed suicide on Tuesday even ing, by cutting his throat. A physician who had been called in to prescribe for him, admonished his wife that it would be unsafe to leave him alone. The Patriot of yesterday says :

About 7:30 o'clock his wife suggested that they would take a walk, to which he assented, and leaving him for a moment in the hall she west up stairs to get ready for the walk.

While she was abeent he went down stairs into a back room in the basement, and cut his threat from car to ear with a large carving knife, severing the windpipe and arteries. His wife came down stairs, and not seeing him in the hall, called for him, but received no reply; hearing some one breathing heavily down in the base-ment, she went to the stairs, but all being dark, was afraid to go down, and called for assistance. One of the boarders answered the call, struck a light, and went into the basement, and found Moulton dead.

As two civil engineers were at work in the wilds of Michigan a couple of weeks ago, eighteen or twenty miles from any camp, one of them began to suspect that the other had become insane—a suspicion which was made certainty when his com-panion came to him and said: "I wish you would hide my revolver and the axes, for I came very near killing you with them for I came very near killing you with them last night. 
