## SPIRITS OF TUKPENTINE.

Ward, having been appointed a Committee to open books and solicit subscriptions from the citizens of New Hanover and Onslow counties, to aid in building the Wilmington and Ouslow Railroad, it has been thought advisable to sub-

a few remark explanatory of the plan by which it is proposed to consummate the work.

The most usual mode of raising funds for the building of railroads is by the issue of stock to individuals for as much of the requisite amount as possible and, if necessary, afterwards mortgaging the road and rolling stock for the remainder. A very superficial knowledge of such matters will enable one to see that this plan in our Southern country, though effectual in the building of railways has rarely proved of any direct benefit to the original subscribers. As an investment, it has few independent ducements, for the cases are not usual where roads have returned a regular dividend. For illustration take those immediately about us. The Stockholders of the Wilmington & Man-chester Railroad have certainly received nothing for money advanced, and now find themselves after many years of patient waiting, in

mit, for the better information of the public,

possession of certificates worth merely the parchment upon which they are printed.

The Wilmington & Weldon Railroad has paid nothing since the war, the Wilmington, Charlotte & Rutherford Railroad nothing at any time, and the North Carolina Railroad has only recently paid a dividend of 6 per cent. These roads are selected for the purpose of illustration, because they are well known in the community, and are under competent and enlightened management, where every effort is made to work them economically and profitably. In short it is a fact too well known to require argument, that the Roads throughout the South, with the exception probably of a few in Georgia, have signally failed to make any direct return to the Stockholders. There are, possibly, many reasons for this state of affairs, not the least of which may be found in the fact that the cost of construction is often greatly increased because Companies are forced to mortgage at a great sacrifice. Now a practical railroad man of large experience, proposes to build this Road and own it, advancing his services and \$35,000 cash-taking all risks-only calling upon the bondholders for the actual cost per mile, less the 35,000 advanced, and guaranteeing to them, upon its completion, an annual dividend of 6 per cent.,

and contracting moreover, to deliver up to them the road and equipments whenever the dividend shall be in arrears for over sixty days. The advantages of this plan are obvious. All surance that the road will be built, that the resources of the country will be developed, that trade will be greatly stimulated, that property along the route will be enhanced in value, that the investment will bring a direct and regular return of 60 per cent., as much as could be hoped for under the most favorable circumstances. And, finally, should this interest ever fail, they will own the road and find themselves exactly in the position of original sub-scribers to the stock, with this great advantage that they have come into possession with an outlay of from thirty-four to forty thousand dollars less than by any other plan.

Suppose that this scheme were rejected, and

you succeeded in raising just \$35,000 less than would be sufficient to complete the work; in other words the same amount of money you are called upon to contribute under this arrangement. You must mortgage jour road to raise the remainder. What is the history of corporations seeking funds by mortgaging Why, even with the advantage of State en dorsement, their bonds have scarcely ever averaged 80 cents in the dollar, and since the war in many instan es much less. These cor porations, moreover, represented roads much longer and better equipped, and which offered innumerable advantages over the one we have under consideration, and might there-fore be expected to do much better with their bonds than you could possibly do with yours, for although you might mortgage for less than one-third the value of your road, you would have to go to outside parties-men unacquainted with your prospects and the facilities of your line. You would lack State endorsement and other guarantees, and you would come upon a market already flooded with bonds, and having safer investments nearer home, so that you would be compelled to sell at a sacrifice. The gauge being different from others, there is no danger that it can ever be the policy of the Managers to make Wilmington a way station, and empty into other cities the produce which should pay a toll here.
