The Revenue Bill.

Our attention was called, yesterday, to s rather serious discrepancy in the Revenue bill as passed by the General Assembly at its last session, and one which is likely to prove s source of no little inconvenience. Sec. 30 of the bill provides that if no one will bid for any piece of real property the amount of the taxes assessed thereon and the charges of the sale, the Sheriff shall bid off the property for the State. Section '35, which provides for the proper reductions to the Sheriff, in his settlement with the State Auditor, gives that officer the benefit of the deduction of the State taxes and charges on property bid off for the State, but fails, probably through oversight, to say a word about the county taxes, as will be seen by the following, which is the article in the section referring to this particular matter :

"3. The amount of State tax on land bid off by the State with the costs attendant on the whole on producing the certificate of the Secretary of State, as is produced for in Sec. 31 of this act."

Burglary.
