The Cape Fear Survey.

S. Commissioner Shaffer, on Sunday, when several witnesses were examined, and the parties coufined in jail natil yesterday morning. The examination was continued yesterday morning, and the witnesses of the previous day crossexamined by the counsel. The parties are charged with going in company with 25 or 30 others, disguised, to the house of Sarah Gilmore, which they forced open and then whipping Sarah Gilmore and her daughter and son, Mary Godfrey, (white) and three negroes who were found on the premises. One of the negroes who attempted to run was shot at and wound ed. Mary Godfrey and one of the daugh-

ters of Sarah Gilmore, had other indigni-ties perpetrated upon their persons other than whipping. The parties whipped Gilmore positively to the identity of the accused, who were, failing to give bail, placed in jail until the next term of the U. S. Court. There appeared to be nothing political in this particular case, as all parties are of the radical persuasion.—Ral.
