LADIES' MEMORIAL ASSOCIATION. Ladies :- The Fifth Anniversary of the "Ladies' Memorial Association' has dawned upon us under auspices more favorable than we could reasonably have expected. When the Association was organized five years ago, the community which we represent (in common with the entire South) had just emerged from have been arrested and lodged in jail. a civil war, the disastrous results of which will be felt for many years to come. With crushed and bleeding hearts for the loss of loved ones who nobly sacrificed their lives in loved ones who nobly sacrificed their lives in defence of our homes and firesides, and impoverlehed by the sudden and utter annihilation of our system of labor, and the consequent prostration of every species of industry, it is no wonder that the energies of our people were for a time paralyzed. Notwithstanding, it is surprising to see the unparalleled vitality and recuperative power displayed by our people in spite of unfriendly legislation and the ironhand of military rule, which has constantly sought to obstruct and in every possible way embarrass our material prosperity. Taking all these things into consideration, we deem ourselves fortunate in having secured about twoselves fortunate in having secured about twothirds of the sum requisite to erect the pro-posed monument. In selecting a design for the monument, a proposition was made to have the column surmounted with the brouzed statue of a Confederate soldier, but the means at our disposal were found to be wholly inade-quate for that purpose and we were led to ex-pect assistance from an association of gentlemen. We regret to say that in this we have

been disappointed, and are consequently fear-ful that we will be compelled to abandon this design. On the Confederate lot in Oakdale. Cemetery, where the remains of four hundred and fifty of our dead heroes repose, every improvement of which it is susceptible, and which the tenderest care could suggest, has been bestowed, and the daughters of Wilmington can now point with pride to that beautiful resting place of our noble defenders. In our labor of love, beneficent nature has most kindly added us dispension, with liberal hand. ly aided us, dispensing with liberal hand her richest verdure and bringing with each returning Spring her vernal offering of fairest flowers to deck "the bivouac of the dead;" while

ers to deck "the bivouac of the dead;" while birds of sweetest song chant their requiem from "morn 'till dewy eve."

It is peculiarly gratifying to see the universal observance of our sad "Memorial Day" and to know that the interest in our fallen, but most righteous cause, instead of abating as time clapses—as some predicted—increases and intensifies with each succeeding year.

We cannot close our report without some tribute to the memory of a deceased officer. Since our last annual meeting, Death has invaded our ranks and removed from our midst an esteemed officer, who now tranquilly sleeps an esteemed officer, who now tranquilly sleeps within the sacred precincts of Qakdale, around within the sacred precincts of Oakdale, around which gather so many hallowed memories. In the death of Mrs. Vansickle, the Association has lost one of its earliest, warmest friends, and a most efficient officer. From its very inception she manifested the deepest interest in the advancement of our work—an interest which did not fiag through a long and painful illness, and was arrested only by the hand of death itself. Words of eulogy in reference to her christian character are all nanecessary. death itself. Words of eulogy in reference to her christian character are all unnecessary. With a cultivated intellect, which in early life was consecrated to the service of religion, her active benevolence, with the liberal means at her disposal, made her a most generous almoner to the poor, while her brilliant social qualities and warm, affectionate nature, endeared her to her numerous friends. Her unwavering trust, and patient endurance of suffering; the beautiful simplicity of her faith; and other christian graces which adorned her life, are too well known to this community to need repetition here. May her memory ever be as fresh and fragrant as the flowers she loved so well, and the annual decoration of her grave be the special care of her sorrowing associates.
