ORDINANCE.

The following Ordinance concerning Dogs passed the Board of Aldermen Monday night, May 15th, 1871. Section 1st. Be it Ordained by the Board of Aldermen, That from the first day of June, 1871, every person keeping or owning a Dog or Dogs, shall pay to the Clerk and Treasurer a Tax of TWO DOLLARS, for each and every Dog so kept or owned by them, for the year 1871, and shall receive a Badge from the said Clerk and Treasurer for each Dog upon which said Tax is paid, which Badge shall be attached to the collar of the Dog; said Tax to be paid on or before the 1st day of June, 1871.

RIVER AND MARINE NEWS.

SATURDAY, May 20th. —Capt. W. J. Potter informs us that the new boiler for the steamer Waccamaw, intended to run between this city and Smithville, was shipped on the Sch. Squires, which sailed from Wilmington, Del., for this port this morning. The Captain informs us that the work on the steamer is progressing finely and that the prospect of soon having her in good running order is very encouraging.

SPIRITS OF TURPENTINE.

—Salem has a debating society. —The Salem Brass Band have new uniforms. —Beaufort county wants a County Agricultural Fair. —The mails between here and Raleigh are out of joint. —Dewberries in Newbern are selling at 3 cents per quart. —Gov. Vance has accepted an invitation to deliver the address at Asbury University, Indiana, in June. —Six prisoners, five colored and one white, escaped from the Stokes county jail on Friday night of last week. —A large mass meeting of the Democratic-Conservative party of Wayne will be held in Goldsboro' next Saturday. —A dog committed suicide in Newbern on Friday. When discovered by the police he was hanging by the neck and quite dead. —A hen in Stokes county lays eggs which are covered with thousands of microscopic eggs. To the naked eye they present simply a rough shell, but under the glass they are perfectly formed eggs. —We learn from the Wilson Ledger that Miss Mollie Blount, of Rocky Mount, met with a severe accident by falling from a buggy in crossing a bridge at that place on Tuesday last. —The Weldon News says: The Episcopalians and Methodists will jointly hold a fair at Gaston on Whit-Monday, the 20th inst., for the benefit of St. Luke and Oak Grove churches. —The Raleigh Sentinel says: Maj. W. M. Robbins, Gen. Seales and Gen. Leach, according to appointment, addressed the people of Forsyth county last Tuesday at Winston on the subject of Convention. An immense crowd was present and the speeches were delivered with telling effect. —The Raleigh Telegram says: On Friday, 19th inst., Mr. Kenneth Thigpen, a prominent citizen of Edgecombe county, and for several years a representative in the Legislature, died suddenly at his home near Tarboro. Dr. F. G. Pitt, a leading man of Edgecombe, died at his residence near Sparta, on the evening of the same day. Edgecombe has lost three prominent citizens within a few weeks.
