STEAM POWER. THE UTROST DISPATCH. May 25-1871. Quarantine Notice. THE FOLLOWING QUARANTINE REGULATIONS will be in force from and after June 1st, 1871:

31. All vessels from Ports South of Cape Fear, will come to the visiting station near Deep Water Point, and await the inspection of the Quarantine Physician.

32. Vessels not included as above will proceed to Wilmington without detention. 33. Pilots are especially enjoined to make careful enquiry, and if not satisfied with the statements of the Captain, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition, they will bring the vessel to the station for further examination.

34. Vessels willfully violating the Quarantine laws are subject to forfeiture of their branch. Masters of vessels to a fine of two hundred dollars a day for every day they violate the Quarantine laws; and all other persons are liable for each and every offence.
