Fatal Accident. As the mail train on the Wil., Char. and Rutherford R. R. was passing Brown Marsh, in Bladen county, on Tuesday, about 124 o'clock, an unfortunate accident happened to a man by the name of Colin Cameron, formerly of Harnett county, who was engaged in teaching school in Bladen, which resulted fatally. It seems that the mall train had stopped for a few moments on theswitch, for turn-off, and deceased was conversing with a gentleman on the platform when a fraint train auddenly and unexpectedly came up, in the rear of the mail train, knocking Mr. C. down and running over him. The engineer perceived his presence and endeavored to reverse his engine, but too late to effect his purpose. Mr. C.'s right leg was badly crushed, his left hip disjointed and his oft leg badly bruised. He was removed to suitable piace and Drs. Dwinelle, of Bladen, and Lowis, of Robeson, were called to his assistance and succeeded in amputating his leg, but he survived the operation but a short time and breathed his last in about four hours and a half after the accident occurred. Deceased was a married man, but had no children. His wife, who resides about five miles from Brown Marsh, was sent for, but arrived a few minutes after his death. He was engaged in teaching school, but was also preparing for the ministry, being a worthy and esteemed member of the Presbyterian Church. He is supposed to have been aged about 24 or 2
