Man Drowned.

Yesterday, about half-past 2 o'clock, as the steamer Cassell was coming down the river and when in the vicinity of what is known as No. 10 MERRY, about six miles above this city, a colored man, who was engaged in cutting wood in the bow of the boat, tread on a round stick of the wood, which rolled under his weight and precipitated him backwards into the river. The accident was discovered by the acting Captain of the steamer, Mr. Sam. Potter, who immediately reversed the engine, when the life-boat was lowered and an attempt made to save the unfortunate man; but, although the boat reached the place where he struck the water in four minutes after the accident, it was too late to rescue him and he found a watery grave. Deceased was a mere youth, being only about 30 or 31 years old, and had only been employed on the boat since Tuesday morning. He was taken on the steamer here, but his name and place of residence are at present unknown. To Capt. Padden, who was not on the boat at the time the accident occurred, we are indebted for the above information.

Flat Load of Roasin Sunk.

A flat belonging to Capt. Potter, containing 300 barrels of rosin, sunk at the wharf in front of the Custom House yesterday afternoon. A portion of the rosin, which was of the finest quality, was saved; the balance will probably be fished up.

More Mad Freaks of the Lunatic, Jim Troy.

Policeman Wm. Brooks, under whose charge Jim Troy, the lunatic, was taken to Whiteville on Tuesday, reports that he was very violent during the trip and succeeded, in his attempts to do mischief, in driving all the passengers from the coach he was in except the officer. His arms were confined with handcuffs, but still he managed to use them with such effect that the policeman had to exert all his strength to prevent his injuring him personally, and in his efforts to escape from the coach he succeeded in breaking some of the windows. Arriving at the depot near Whiteville he was taken out, when his madness assumed a more violent and dangerous character, and the officer appealed in vain for assistance in taking him to the village, which he reached in an almost exhausted condition. The madman was then taken to Mr. Baldwin, Chairman of the Board of County Commissioners, who, after consultation with the Sheriff, ordered him to be taken to jail. When the order was given the lunatic made a furious assault upon those two officers and succeeded in disarranging their wearing apparel. Finally, however, he was lodged in jail and heavily ironed, where he will remain until some more appropriate disposition shall be made of him.
