



Ex-Goy. Holden.

We find the following extract from a letter from ex Gov. Holden, now in Washington City, to a friend in Raleigh :

"I do not know when I shall return. I am taking no part in politics. You may well imagine I have no taste for such things. I am living in a retired part of the city, and have ample time for meditation. Yet no one loves North Carolina more than I do. As I said in my inaugural: Her sky is above my home as it will be above my grave. I am here, not to avoid lawful process, for some of that was served on me before I left; but to allow the minds of excited people on both sides to cool. We want peace, quiet, good will and a closer brotherhood in the State, and I am prepared to do any. thing that a Christian man ought to do to effect this result. Persons who suppose that I would return clothed with power from the centre expect to enter them again. I am simply ambitious to do our people all the good I can while I live."
