Colored Girl Attempts to Poison Whole Family. We hear of a most diabolical attempt having been made in Duplin county a few days

since to poison a whole family.

A colored girl, about 20 years old, employed in the family of Mr. Wash. Carroll, having under some pretext or other, become offended with Mrs. Carroll, made a mixture of fly poison and some poisonous herbs which she obtained in the woods in the vicinity and distributed it in the food which was placed on the table for the family 10 eat. The household consisted of Mr. Carroll, his wife and three children, all of whom partook of the poisonous compound. Fortunately for them, however, the girl overdosed them with the mixture, which had the effect first to make them deathly sick and then to vomit, by which their

lives were saved. As soon as the girl discovered the effect of the poison upon her intended victims, she made her escape, but was pursued by the neighbors and finally captured on the line between New Hanover and Duplin, when she was taken to Kenansville and lodged in jail, When asked why she attempted to destroy the lives of her employers she said that she and Mrs. Carroll could not agree.
