The Sampson County Prisoners.

The examination of witnesses for the defence in the case of Hardy Royall, Hanson Hunnicott and Raiford Royall was commenced Friday evening and continued until a late hour that night. On yesterday morning, when Court assembled and the jury were cailed, it was ascertained that one of their number, Mr. J. R. Pigford, was quite ill and unable to sit in the box. It was then moved by the counsel for the prosecution that further proceedlogs in the case be postponed until Monday morning, which was acceded to by the counsel for the delense. Later in the day, however, Col. W. H. McKoy, for the defence, presented for the consideration of the Court the following affidavit: STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA,

And these afflants are informed and believe that the organization existing in this county above refer-red to is so inimical and hostile to the said Ku-Klux Klan, which said organization charges does exist, that these affiants verily believe that it is not possibly for any defendant who is charged with being a member of said Klan, or suspected thereof, to get a fair and impartial trial in New Hanover county, and they do not believe that they can obtain a fair trial in the county of New Hanover.

The motion for a new trial and the removal of the cause to another county was ably argued by Col. McKoy and Maj. D. J. Devane, in support of the proposition and by M. London, Esq., for the State, in opposition to the proposed removal, at the conclusion of which His Honor, Judge Russell, rendered his decision in favor of the prayer of the defendants and fixed upon Brunswick as the county to which the cause should be removed; the trial to take place at the next October term of the Superior Court for that county.

Ma. D. J. Devane then moved for a reduction of the bonds required of the defendants, supporting his motion in an argument of some length, but it was not granted by Judge Russell and the defendants, together with the other prisoners from Sampson, were bound over as follows, to appear at the next term of Brunswick Court: Hanson Hunnicutt, defendant; W. DR. WM W. HARRISS, President of the Chamber of Commerce : My DEAR SIR: As required by the Chamber, my regular monthly visit to the Public-Works near Zeke's Island, for the improveday; and it is with much pleasure that I am now able to report the perfect completion of the work across Deep Inlet, the Northern end of the finished superstructure resting firmly upon the highest part of the old stone work at a point designated upon the plan of works as the cross, thus effectually sealing up this inlet.

in a substantial and permanent manner. When we take into consideration the formidable character of this work, an opening of about or over five bundred feet, requiring a superstructure over six hundred feet lineal by twenty feet wide and over forty feet high, to shut out or stop a current of water passing in and out at a rate of eight or ten miles an hour, and all of this to be accomplished within the short space of about eight months, and at a cost within the sum of one hundred thousand cost within the sum of one hundred thousand dollars, I think I may safely be allowed to congratulate the Chamber upon the satisfactory manner in which the work has been prosecuted. And I trust that I may be pardoned for here expressing my high appreciation of the skill and industry of the officers who designed and executed this great work.

Owing to the mild weather of late and prevented the same provented to the s
