Whitewash. The following is sent out by the Lighthouse Board of the Treasury Department: "The following receipt for whitewashing has been found by experience to answer on wood, brick, and stone, nearly as well as oil paint, and is much cheaper: Slake half a bushel of unslaked lime with boiling water, keeping it covered during the process. Strain it and add a peck of salt, dissolved in warm water; three pounds of rice put in boiling water and boil to a paste; half a pound of powdered Spanish whiting, and a pound of clear glue, dissolved in warm water; mix these well together, and let the mixture stand for several days. Keep the wash thus prepared in a kettle or portable furnace, and when used put it on as hot as possible, with a painter's or whitewash brush."

— Mr. James Brown, the plasterer, who was recently so severely injured by the explosion of a barrel of lime, is slowly recovering, though his eyes are yet in a very bad condition.

— The first cotton blooms from Anson were sent to us yesterday by Mr. J. M. Henry, of Lilesville, from whose "patch" they were taken. There were two of them fully developed.

— This city and vicinity was visited by a heavy shower of rain on Sunday afternoon, accompanied by the most terrific thunder and lightning and a high wind. The rain was very acceptable.

— Rev. Dr. Moran was taken suddenly ill during the delivery of his sermon on Sunday morning last and was compelled to suspend the exercises, but we were glad to see him on our streets again yesterday.

— Mattie Ballard, better known as "Big Mattie," a white woman of dissipated habits, was picked up on Nutt street yesterday afternoon in a beastly state of intoxication. She was taken to the Guard House.

— Thanks to Mr. R. L. Harris, of the Front Street News Depot, for copies of the last N. Y. Ledger and Chimney Corner. He keeps a constant supply of all the popular newspapers and periodicals of the day.

— Wm. Roberts and Hows, both colored, were sent to the Work House yesterday. The latter was serving out a sentence in that institution, but had been sent to the City Hospital for treatment, from whence he is now returned to the Work House.

— Mr. Lumford Clark, well known among our citizens as a submarine diver, died at his residence in this city yesterday morning. Circumstances connected with his death render it more than probable that the peculiar employment which he followed was the main cause of it.

At Last. The efforts of Geo. L. Mabson, the colored member from this county in the last Legislature, who has been making application for license to practice law, have at last been rewarded with success. He qualified before the Supreme Court now in session at Raleigh on the 17th inst., his certificate, which was signed by Justices Pearson, Kease, Rodman and Dick, authorizes him to practice law in all the Courts of the State. Justice Boyden, being sick, was not present.

— Taking into consideration the fact that this is the first instance in which a colored man has been admitted to the Bar of North Carolina, it may not be amiss to give a short sketch of the recipient of the honor. George Lawrence Mabson was born in Wilmington, N. C., and is 25 years of age. At the age of 8 years he left his native town and went to Boston, Mass., where he attended school up to the time of the breaking out of the war. He then volunteered in the U. S. Navy and served two years, at the expiration of which time he enlisted in the 5th Massachusetts Cavalry, in which he served until the close of the war. In 1868 he returned to North Carolina, and in 1869 began the study of law, graduating at Howard University, Washington, D. C., in the Class of January, 1871. In personal appearance, he is what may be termed a light mulatto, being about five feet ten inches in height, slight built and of rather prepossessing appearance. In intelligence he can compare favorably with any of his race that have come under our observation.

Quarantine Notice. THE FOLLOWING QUARANTINE REGULATIONS will be in force from and after June 1st, 1871: — 1st. All vessels from Paris South of Cape Fear, will come to at the visiting station near Deep Water Point, and await the inspection of the Quarantine Physician.

2d. All vessels having sickness on board on arrival, or having had sickness during the voyage, are required to come to the station for inspection, without regard to the Port from whence they sailed.

3d. Vessels not included as above, will proceed to Wilmington without detention.

4th. Pilots are especially enjoined to make careful enquiry, and if not satisfied with the statements of the Captain, or if the vessel is in a filthy condition, they will bring the vessel to the station for further examination.

5th. Pilots willfully violating the Quarantine laws are subject to forfeiture of their branch, and to a fine of \$500, or a term of imprisonment of six months, or both, at the discretion of the Court.

All persons subject to visitation under these regulations will set a flag in the main rigging—port side.
