C., has, ust obtained a patent for notable improvements in the frames of umbrellas and parasols, and he designs visiting Richmond soon to see if he can find enough enterprise here to join him in establishing a factory for the manufac ture of umbrellas and parasols on a large scale, under his patent. Should he not succeed in obtaining the proper encouragement in this city, he will carry his invention further North. The main features in this patent umbrella frame (of which we have seen full drawings)

seem to be that it utterly dispenses with wires and rivets and the weakening effects of the lat-ter; is easily taken apart and put together, and is so durable that one of them will outlast a number of covers. The joints are formed by balls at the ends of the ribs and braces, which work in slitted spherical cavities prepared to receive them—no part, either in the staff, ries or braces having to be weakened by holes for wire or rivet. Should a part by any accident break, it can be readily removed and a new one substituted. The inventor is a practical man, and he has found on experiment that he can manufacture his frame as cheaply as the present bungling, frail, and unsatisfactory frame can be made, if not cheaper. The new irame can be made, if not cheaper. The new umbrella has so many obvious advantages over the old style that it is bound to utterly supercede it. ROCKINGHAM, Richmond Co., N. C., June 20th. To the Editor of the Wilmington Star.

DEAR SIR :- As I am not accustomed to write for newspapers, if I should make some mistakes I beg to be excused. I would not write now, but for information, and a put at vine

And first, I would like to know of the Superintendent of the above named road, if it has more than it can carry in the way of freight, or does he intend to cut us off entirely from the advantages of said road, and leave us

from the advantages of said road, and leave us "out in the cold?"

The people up here in this dark corner had reason to expect some benefit from the road, while they contribute liberally to its support. Consequently, they have liceured considerable expense in planting and cultivating the best varieties of fruit trees, believing that when the trees came to bearing, the railroad would furnish good facilities for transporting their fruit to market. These trees have now commenced bearing, and better varieties of menced bearing, and better varieties of fruit cannot be found. But what does it amount to? Just at the time the said fruit is ripe and ready for market we find a new and increased tariff which simply amounts to a total prohibition. Eighty ceats for one hundred pounds! making about 58 cents for a box or bushel of fruit! Let us see if this exorbitant price will work for the advantage, either of the railroad or the fruit growers. In the first place, the roud loses the freight on four or five hundred bushels of fruit, and the four or five hundred bushels of fruit, and the farmer loses his fruit. The farmer would purchase goods in your city with the money he might get for his fruit, which goods he would ship over the road. Out at the present rates of freight he caunet affords o ship his fruit—It must rot upon the ground. He loses it, and the road loses freight both ways. Nor is this all. Your merchants lose the trade, the far-mer is discouraged, and neglects his orchard, the nursery man falls, and thus the whole thing "goes by the board," , sakey not suot

Now, we are all anxious to trade with the merchants of Wilmington, and to patronize our own towns and cities. But if we are not treated differently we must of necessity go where we can be dealt with justly, and where railroad managers consult the public good as well as their own interest.
