Coroner Hewlett summoned a jury yester day and held an inquest over the body of colored boy about 14 years of age, by the name of Jehn Bradley, who was drowned while in bathing at a dock just below the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford depot on Thursday evening. It seems that deceased and another boy were jumping over each other in the water and Bradley was performing that feat when he suddenly went down and did not rise again. It was thought possible that the other boy might have given him a kick and thereby stunned him, but the evidence before the Coroner's jury was conclusive at all events that his drowning was purely accidental and a verdict was returned accordingly.

Heartless Brutality.

We were informed yesterday of a horrible case of depravity on the part of a colored boy about 10 or 12 years of age, and which is considered likely to result in serious consequences. The identity of the boy, we believe, is at present unknown, but it is said that a small colored child, aged about 2 years, was playing on the street North of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, when the larger boy came along with a can of kerosene. Throwing the little fellow on his back and pressing his mouth open he poured a good portion of the contents of the can down the throat of the helpless child, and then went on his way. The child was subsequently taken home to his mother and at last accounts its stomach had swollen out of all shape and its month was so inflamed that its lips had all the appearance of being turned inside out. He seemed to suffer intense agony, as may well be imagined, and it is feared from the flery nature of the substance that death may ensue. The boy who was guilty of this heartless brutality on a mere lofant should be ferrited out and severely punished, even if the child should recover.

Cape Fear Academy. Examinations at this institution were continued on yesterday, and exhibited results gratifying in the highest degree to those who were present.

Yesterday's examinations were various as to subjects, and many of the cadets were subjected to a very severe test in being compelled to suddenly transfer their attention from one subject of study to another of a most dissimilar character. A characteristic of this institution, however, is the thoroughness of the in. struction given in all the branches of its extensive course, and the young gentlemen fortified by their thorough and accurate training during the session, have b en able to meet most creditably, all the varied demands made upon them.

Dr. Meade opened the exercises on yester day by an extended examination of the class in Chemistry, illustrated by experiments of an interesting character. Subsequently General Colston examined several classes in Mathematics, and Mr. Alfriend a class in English Grammar and Composition. Both gentlemen subjected their classes to severe and exhaustive examinations, and the results amply vindicated the industry of the instructors and the zeal of the pupils.

About one-half of the classes in this institu tion have thus far been examined, and the spectators who have witnessed the examinations are unanimous in pronouncing them almost unexampled in their fairness and thoroughness. Such examinations are in truth examinations, and not mere exhibitions by pupils carefully crammed for a special purpose.

To-day General Colston will examine the Senior Class in Mathematics. This class has been brought to a very high degree of proficiency by the constant industry of the General in its instruction. Under his personal supervision the class will to-day practically illustrate Surveying, a branch to which the cadets have given most earnest and interested attention. The public are cordially invited to be present.


