ANSON SUPERIOR COURT.

Trial of Two of the Redfern Murderers—They are Found Guilty and Sentenced to be Hung on the 21st of July Next. In the matter of the murder of James W. Redfern, for the investigation of which a special term of the Superior Court is now in session at Wadesboro, we learn from an Extra from the office of the Free Press Herald that the Grand Jury returned a true bill against five of the prisoners charged and confined in jail.

Upon the return of the bill on Tuesday, the prisoners were brought to the bar of the Court. They declared their inability to employ counsel, whereupon the Court assigned Messrs. Steele and Walker, of Rockingham, and Cyrus J. Knight, of Wadesboro, counsel for their defense.

Cape Fear Academy—Distribution of Prizes—Address to the Cadets, &c. A large number of our citizens, including many ladies, assembled at Thalian Hall yesterday afternoon to listen to the address of Griffith J. Mr. Editor:—By the kind invitation of Mr. Wm. L. Beery, agent of the steam tug Alpha, some fifteen of us assembled on board at 2 1/2 o'clock, on the morning of the 28th, when we took the English Barque Susie in tow and carried her as far as the lower shoals, about four miles from Smithville, where she grounded, the tide having fallen.

We reached the Blackfish Grounds about 8 1/2 o'clock, in charge of Mr. Ephraim Gause, one of our best pilots and a perfect gentleman, to whose skill and knowledge the party were indebted for their unprecedented success, and they, appreciating the above facts, passed a unanimous vote of thanks to him.

As soon as the tug arrived at the spot, so well known by our skiff pilots, we dropped our lines overboard, and finding the fish there in great abundance, we put our buoy out and fished in sight of it for five hours, and succeeded in capturing about 3,000 fish.
