The Next Fair. At a meeting of the Executive Committee of the Cape Fear Agricultural Association, held at the Commercial Exchange last evening, it was decided that the next annual Fair in this city should commence on Tuesday, the 14th of November.

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C. F. A. Association.

At a meeting of the members of the Cape Fear Agricultural Association, held at the Hall of the Chamber of Commerce last night, all the proposed amendments to the Constitution were concurred in. The Telegram says: We learn that a serious cutting scrape occurred in Oak Grove Township, in Wake county, on Saturday night last. George W. Gully, a person of notoriously bad character, had been in the habit of so mistreating his wife that on Saturday she found it necessary to leave home for her own safety, which she did, going to the house of a gentleman of the name of Massey. At night, Gully went to Massey's home and endeavored to induce his wife to return home with him, which she refused to do. He then endeavored to force her to accompany him, when Mrs. Massey interposed and begged that Mrs. Gully be permitted to remain, if she did not wish to go. This infuriated the demon Gully, and drawing a knife, he endeavored to cut Mrs. Massey's throat, giving her two severe cuts on the head. Mr. Massey, coming to the assistance of his wife, was assaulted by Gully, and badly cut about the face, the nose and upper lip split, and receiving two severe stabs in the body. Massey is in a very critical position, and but little hopes are entertained of his recovery. Gully, the desperado, is still at large, and bids defiance to the officers of the law.
