Marshal's Office, CITY OF WILMINGTON. JULY 1st, 1871.

The attention of Commission Merchants and Dealers in Naval Stores is respectfully called to Section 15th, of the City Ordinance, which is as follows:

No turpentine, tar, pitch, rosin, spirits of turpentine, lumber, shingles, staves, cotton, or other combustible material, shall be permitted to remain longer than forty-eight hours on any wharf or lot, or in any warehouse, in any part of the city between First and Second streets on the North, Second street on the South, and Miller's Alley on the South, unless such articles be stored in fire-proof warehouses; and every person refusing or failing to remove such articles after forty-eight hours, upon being notified by the Mayor, shall forfeit and pay one hundred dollars for each and every day of such neglect or failure.

The above will be strictly enforced hereafter.
