Henderson Young, who is to be hung in Mecklenburg county on the 14th of July, makes a clean breast of the perpetration of the murder for which he was convicted.

The son of W. S. Royster, Esq., aged about four years, was seriously burned on Saturday last in Goldsboro. His dress caught fire from a match. Matches are dangerous things in the hands of children.

The Washington Express says: We learn that a man by the name of Jacob Brown, well known in this county, was engaged in digging a well in the vicinity of Jamesville, Martin county, and when down about 25 feet below the surface, the earth caved in upon him. At last accounts he had not been reached.

Resolved, That it is recommended to all Stockholders who may not be able to attend the annual meeting, to instruct their proxies to see that nothing be done favoring this project, or any similar proposal.

Raleigh, N. C., July 5, 1871.

WHEREAS, George Z. French has tendered to me his resignation as a member of the House of Representatives from New Hanover County; and whereas, said resignation has been accepted;

Now, therefore, I, TOD R. CALDWELL, Governor of the State of North Carolina, do issue this my Proclamation, in accordance with law, commanding the Sheriff of New Hanover County to open polls and hold an election in said county on Thursday, the 3rd day of August, 1871, to fill said vacancy; said election to be conducted in all respects in accordance with law.
