Horrible Murder-Another Case for the Mu Klux Outrage Committee. A white man, by the name of John Stancell, was murdered at Cero Gordo, Columbus county, on Wednesday night, under circumstances of peculiar atrocity. Mr. Stancell had been on a visit to this city and left for his home on the 7 o'clock train Wednesday evening. Arriving at Cero Gordo late that night, and as he lived some distance in the country, he laid himself down in the plazza of Mr. J. E. Buie's store, with the intention of walting until daylight to resume his journey. The next morning his dead body was found in the piazza alluded to, the head badly mutilated with an axe and nearly severed from the trunk. There were three distinct and deep cuts on the head, either of which would have been sufficient to produce death: Upon the discovery of the body of the unfortunate man, immediate steps were taken to ferret out the villain who perpetrated the deed. Tracking the murderer, they finally succeeded in arresting a negro man to whom circustances point with almost unerring certainty, we learn, as the guity party, and he was brought down to

Whiteville yesterday and lodged in jail. It is generally supposed that the negro, whose name we could not ascertain, was under the impression that his victim was Mr. Buie himself, and that he had money in his

The Big Time at Abbottsburg.

A correspondent gives us a very touching description of the grand radical celebration at Abbottsburg on Tuesday, especially of that part of it in which a certain "old, very poor, hard-worked ox and two or three of the leanest sheep that ever bleated" figured as the barbecue, the latter being under the supervision, our correspondent was informed, of an old colored man by the name of Harry, a former city scavenger of Wilmington. The antiquated character of the aforesaid ox, however, was not the worst feature of the case, as our correspondent represents the animal to have been in an advanced state of decomposition, so much so that a certain species of the winged tribe, which is put to such a useful purpose by the municipality of a neighboring city that it enjoys special immunity from the usual fate of its kind, had to be driven forcibly from the carcass before the process of cooking could be commenced. This was on the 3rd. On the morning of the 4th, after the "beef" had been, in the language of our correspondent, "roasted, sun-burned and sprinkled with salted, muddy water," it was served up to such of the crowd whose olfactories were suffici ntly blunted by excessive hunger as to be able to undergo the process of mastication of this venerable and defunct specimen of

Next came the speeches by Mabson, Schenck and Eagles, with one or two others. Very few white men were present and the speakers seemed to take advantage of this. They roared and thundered against Democracy and Convention and tried to delude them in every manner possible. They charged that if the Democrats were allowed to gain control of the Homestead and Lien Laws they would imprison all who are not able to pay their debts, &c., &c. They talked of slavery, patroling and other stuff, trying to make the colored men believe that if the Democrats were again in power they would deprive them of the right of suffrage and even of freedom. With such like nonsence as this, which they knew to be the merest bosh, the speakers regaled the assembled crowd until their patience was exhausted and they sought for enjoyment more

A Colored Man Makes a Murderous Assault upon his Wife.

Yesterday about one o'clock, as policeman Josh. Green, who resides north of the Wilmington and Weldon Railroad, was on his way to his dinner, he was startled by loud cries of murder proceeding from a house on Fifth, between Red Cross and Campbell streets. occupied by one John A. Henderson, colored. The officer has no doubt that Henderson would have finished his bloody work with another well-directed blow with the stick, but for his timely arrival and arrest of the would-be-murderer. He was promptly lodged in the Guard House, without the privivilege of bail, to await the result of the injuries inflicted upon his wife, and a hearing before the City Court.


