The Excursion Yesterday.

The steamer Waccamaw left her wharf yesterday morning with a large party of ladies and gentlemen, for an excursion to Smithville. Arriving off the Bar near Fort Caswell, a number of the passengers expressed a desire to go a short distance outside, which request was acceded to. The boat performed the outward passage without difficulty, although the tide was falling, but on attempting to re-enter, and after passing the outer Bar, she grounded on the rip, and all efforts to get her off proved unavailing. A messenger was thereupon immediately dispatched to the Revenue Cutter Wm. H. Seward, lying in the harbor of Smithville, for assistance. With the promptitude characteristic of her worthy commander, Captain Carson, she was soon alongside of the Waccamaw, and the passengers were speedily removed, when the Cutter started for Wilmington, arriving here about 8% o'clock. The Waccamaw was in all probability gotten off during the flood tide last night, and will doubtless resume her trips to day.

During the afternoon, a meeting of participants in the excursion was held in the cabin of the Cutter, when Dr. T. B. Carr was called to the Chair, and S. I. West, Esq., was requested to act as Secretary. A committee, consisting of Messrs. Frank H. Alfriend, John Cowan and Preston Cumming, was appointed to draft suitable resolutions, who, through their Chairman, Mr. Alfriend, submitted the following:

Resolved 1st. That the thanks of all who participated in the excursion of to-day which, by unforseen circumstances, was seriously em-barrassed, at a moment when no assurance of a pleasurable character was wanting, are due to Captain John Carson, of the Cutter Seward, and to his officers and men, for assistance handsomely rendered under circumstances not authorizing the expectation of such courtesy.

Resolved, 2d. That to Capt. Carson, and to his officers and men we make an expression of gratitude especially earnest on behalf of the ladies of our company for the most courteous and timely aid rendered them at a time of se-

rious perplexity.
