Rivalry in Cotton Farming

From a private letter received by the firm of Messrs. Edwards & Hall, of this city, we learn that, last year, seven cotton planters of Columbus county, made an agreement between themselves that they would try an experiment to see which could produce the most cotton from one acre of ground, and that the remainder would pay the one of their number who produced the largest amount the sum of \$5 each. The experiment was made and the result, in lint cotton, was as follows:

The two highest produced an average of two good bales to the acre, which at present prices would be worth about \$160. As one bale to an acre is considered a fair average on a cotton farm, our readers will see what can be done by a determined effort. This kind of rivalry beats tournaments "all hollow," as there is something to be gained by it.
