The new election law requires every man to vote in the township of which he is a resident. Joe Chadbourne, colored, was sent to the Work House yesterday for the non-payment of fine and costs in the City Court.

The excursionists on the steamer Waccamaw yesterday had a good time below and arrived at the wharf in this city at 4 1/2 o'clock P. M. The danger of throwing rocks or shells in the streets is illustrated by the fact that a colored child, in the arms of a boy, was struck by a shell thrown by another boy in Newbern.
