THE DEATH PENALTY. Sudden Death. ob of fire adthed ad been Hauging of the Redfearn Murderers-Our Reporter Interviews the Con-

demned-Jim Cappedge Respited-Confession, Scenes, Ineidents, &c., e vigoronaly in the campaignash WADESBORO, July 21. The two negroes, Ned Myers and Lewis Coppedge, were executed here to-day. Jim Coppedge, convicted at the same term, has been respited by Gov, Caldwell until 1st De-

comber. The crowd in attendance was immense-a majority being negross. Since yesterday evening they have been pouring in from all directions, many coming from the adjoining counties and South Carolina. The gallows, crected in the jall yard, was enclosed by buildings and a high wall on three sides, but outside the yard fence, on the rising ground toward the Court House, a view could

be obtained, and on housetops and trees and all available spots hundreds and hundreds of spectators were assembled. . It is to be regreted that white women, in considerable numbers, were present. 19001

Mingling with the motly crowd remarks of all kinds could be heard : some amusing, some silly, occasionally a sensible one, and very frequently such as were almost startling from their levity, coarseness or brutality. All courtesies and attention were shown reporters for the Press by the efficient and gentlemanly young Sheriff and his deputies, a room in the jail being assigned them with a large window opening within a few feet of the

innocent; that the statements he made when arrested were caused by a fear that he would be immediately hung, and that his only hope then was in implicating as many as he could that he had for a long time intended to kill Redfearn; that he first was lead to meditate it by Patterson, a yankee with whom he was once imprisoned for breaking and robbing Red-fearn's store; that while in jail together they agreed to kill and rob R. as soon as released but that Patterson left the county and had nothing to do with the murder. When asked if Redfearn had not been a kind and good friend to them, both promptly answered yes; and Lewis added, "nothing but money, the devil and what bad white men told me, ever

made me kill poor Mas. Jim."

A gentleman present remarked that he was one of the jury which tried and convicted the prisoners. Lewis said "yes, I know you, and the jury done right as to me." Ned added, "1 die wrong, though I know what I confessed myself and what other folks told, made the jury believe that I was guilty."

Lewis expressed great anxiety to have a long 'talk" to the multitude and asked that his wish be carried to the Sheriff; asked for a drink of water, which was given him; said he "wished it was over with," but he wanted "to talk to every body and tell them to do better than he had done," and here the interview ended.

As the writer passed down stairs a most worthy-looking and rather venerable man at his side observed, "I have seen eleven men hang before-these will make thirteen, and I believe that uone ever more fully deserved it than these two."

Ministers of the Gospel had visited the condemned men early in the morning-and held appropriate services.

The crowd still increased : from the nature of the surroundings it was impossible to estimate the number present; but it may be safely said, upon the authority of many old citizens, that more people were in Wadesboro' to-day than ever before, at one time, and they say the town has always been a "great place for great crowde."

Fortunately for those daring ones perched apon ridge-poles and swaying limbs, as well as for the compact mass on terra firma the day was pleasant, thin clouds and a light breeze dispelling the heat; but the dust was flying and rolling around in a manner far from agreeable.

At 12.45 the prisoners were brought down and ascended the scaffold, neither seeming excited. Lewis, with a laugh, threw his hat to a colored man near and in a firm and loud voice commenced his "talk," which differed in no material point from those statements already made. He called on different members of the family by name and asked their forgive-ness. Calling upon his colored friends, he counselled them against all bad conduct and bad counsels, and told them that the Radical or "Union" party was a dangerous one and not friendly to the black man; that if they followed the Badical leaders longer many of them would at last stand where he now stood ; that since his arrest no Republicans had ever approached him or offered him a friendly act or word.

Here Sam Redfearn, a very intelligent and worthy colored man, asked Lewis certain questions bearing upon confessions made. Lewis was much confused and made contradictory statements. Sam declared in a most impressive manner that Lewis was lying in his death moments ! Numerous questions were asked by different persons, but Lewis seemed not disposed to talk fartuer.

Ned merely remarked that he had no more to say than he had already said, and contin-ned to look upon the assemblage with the -ame stolid gaze and semi-defiant demeanor which he had kept up all the time.

Rev. Mr. Bland, of the Episcopal Church,

was the proper reserve of a gentleman. Early to seek the Way of Life he has ever drawn consolation from the Eternal Fountain, and falling asleep in the arms of his Saviour he now rests in Paradise. 

At 1:40 Drs. Ashe and McRae, after examina-tion, prenounced them both dead, and the bodies were cut down and placed in coffins.
