Republican Meeting Last Night.

The anti-Conventionists held a meeting at the Theatre last night, which was addressed by Isaac Myers, "Esq.," of Baltimore, and "Hon." Geo. L. Mabson, of this city, both colored. Myers spoke for about two hours and a half, his effort being the merest bosh, without point or pith. His speech was ostensibly in the interest of the labor movement and the political status of the colored people, but it turned out to be principally in the interest of Myers himself. Mabson, of course, spread himself on the Convention question.

Speaking at Point Caswell.

There was a large gathering at Point Caswell, in Caswell Township, on Wednesday. Addresses were delivered by Maj. F. D. Poisson and Maj. C. W. McClammy in favor of Convention, and by Judge Cantwell and R. B. Frayzer, Esq., in opposition. Judge Cantwell lead off and was followed by Maj. Poisson, who delivered a most effective speech, totally annihilating the Judge's arguments. The latter, being between two fires, faired badly, as Mr. Frayzer gave him an awful rasping, alluding particularly to his inconsisting in being among the foremost for secession until he saw that the cause was hopeless, when he deserted his friends and comrades, whose flag was trailing in the dust, and sought a position in the triumphant chariot, of his enemies. He evedently thinks the Judge is not a man to be trusted.

Maj. McClammy followed in and able and telling speech. The crowd was large and the speeches were listened to attentively.

Gov. Caldwell Goes to Robeson. His Excellency, Governor Caldwell, arrived in this city last evening and took lodging at the Purcell House. During the evening a number of his political and personal friends called upon him. We learn that he will take the train on the Wilmington, Charlotte and Rutherford Railroad this morning for Robeson' where he will meet in consultation the leading and influential citizens of both parties in reference to the state of affairs in that unfortunate county.

Alluding to this visit of the Governor, the Raleigh Telegram of yesterday says:

. The sad state of affairs in that section calls for some decided action, and the Governor has deemed it best to consult with the people down there, before taking further steps in the matter. We will here state, that Governor Caldwell has been semi-officially informed that the President will send no troops to Robeson, unless it can be shown that the opposition to law and order there is more formidable than that of a half dozen desperate men, but if neces-sary, the Governor will employ the whole power of the State to put them down.
