Correspondence of the Star. LILESVILLE, N. C., July 27, 1871. EDITOR STAR: Three weeks ago to-day, after eleven days of very hot, dry weather, we had a good rain-since which we have had none. To 20th inst., the heat was intense, the mercury indicating an average temperature during that time of 93 degrees at mid-day. From that to present time the weather has been unusually cool for the season, the nights and mornings

resembling those of the latter part of September, with constant strong and drying winds, mostly from South, East, and Northeast. A few miles from this point sundry large planters had no rain on the day mentioned above, near five dry weeks having now passed over them. Their crops, judging from the condition of ours here, must be ruined beyond reclamat on; the most sangnine saying that here they are cut short one-third, while many believe that one ha'f is not the full extent of the damage to the crops, particularly corn, potatoes, peas, &c. Of course gardens are "gone up."

The mere length of the "dry spell" is not remarkable, but owing to the unprecedented amount of rain which preceded it, its effects are unusually disastrous.

And that's all I can tell you about the weather and crops, except that we have no apples nor cider; and peaches, though abundant, are all "wormy" and scorched and "dried up."
