SAMPSON. A gentleman writing from Clinton, Sampson county says: "I have been trying to get the official vote to send. The returns have just come in, and are as follows:

Board of Aldermen. The Board met in regular monthly session last evening, Mayor Martin in the chair.

It was resolved that a committee of five persons be appointed by the Mayor to examine and test the steam fire engine "Cape Fear," and report whether the same is built as per contract, and report their examination to this Board to-day, at 1 o'clock.

The following were appointed said committee: Jno. F. Finger, Mr. Lyons, of W. C. and A. R. R. Capt. J. F. Divine, of W. & W. R. B. C. R. Banks, Walter Scott, of U. S. Revenue Cutter.

It was resolved that the action of the Mayor in placing the hand Fire Engine No. 2 on the West side of the river, be approved, provided it is distinctly understood that the engine shall be kept in good order by the Railroad Company free of expense to the city; and that the city shall not be called upon for any expenditure for repairs or for keeping up the organization of the company.

A petition from sundry citizens praying for an extension of the fire limits, was referred to a special committee, consisting of the Committee on Fire Department and the Marshal, with instructions to report at the next regular meeting.

A petition from Messrs. Grmbrell & Houseman, asking permission to remove their boiler from where it now stands to within their shed on Nitt's wharf, was granted.

It was ordered that the Chief Engineer report to the Marshal, monthly, the condition of the material of the fire Department, the number of members and efficiency of the companies, and all such other matters as are of interest and required by city ordinances or orders of the Chief of Fire Department, on or before the 5th of each month; and that each company is hereby ordered to report to the Chief Engineer by or before the 3d day of each, and every month.

Local Notes.

There will be another trial of the new steam fire engine at Neff's wharf this morning. There are 20 prisoners at present confined in the county jail, of which number only 3 are white.

Mr. Antonio flush sent us a basket of Scuppernon grapes—the first of the season. He will have a full supply in market in a few days.

The August term of the Superior Court for New Hanover county will convene in this city on Monday next, the 14th inst., His Honor, Judge Russell, presiding.

The Contested Election Case.

The question of certain frauds and informality practiced during the late election in this county came up before the Board of County Commissioners yesterday and arguments were heard as to whether the Board was competent to hear and decide cases of this character.

The counsel for the contestants, Messrs. Ashe and Polson, contended that the Board could legally and properly decide the question of the illegality of the returns, and argued at some length to sustain their position. The Board, however, decided by an unanimous vote that it had no jurisdiction in the matter, and then proceeded to compare the vote and to attend to other business before them.

There was quite a large crowd present during the discussion of the election question. The excursionists on the Waccamaw to-morrow (Wednesday) will leave at 9 A. M., and at Smithville, thence go to sea over Main Bar, return to Smithville and arrive at home at 8 P. M. They will doubtless have a very pleasant time.

RUSSELL.—At his residence in this city, on the 31st of July, Mr. Daniel L. Russell, Sr. Mr. Russell had been for many years a respected and prominent citizen of this section of North Carolina. He was born in the County of Onslow in October, 1833, and hence was near sixty-eight years of age at the time of his death. He removed to the County of Brunswick in the year 1840, and up to the capture of Wilmington by the Federal forces in 1862 continued to reside in that county, where he had accumulated a large property. He frequently represented the County of Brunswick in the Legislature of the State, and was for many years a leading member of the old Whig Party. For many years both before and after the war he was Chairman of the County Court of Brunswick, over which he presided with acceptability to all parties, in which position he was continued until the abolition of the County of Brunswick in the Constitutional Convention convened under the policy of President Johnson. In 1868 he was elected by the Legislature of that year one of the Council of State, and in that capacity acted as one of the Constitutional advisers of the late Governor Worth. Possessed of a strong mind and unexhaustable energy he had commenced to recover from the sad calamities of war, which all had alike suffered, when he was overtaken by the lingering and distressing disease, cancer, which, after a long and painful illness, resulted in his death. Up to the termination of the war he lived upon his fine estate in Brunswick, and many there are who remember the warm and generous hospitality which was there dispensed. Another old style North Carolina gentleman has passed away, leaving behind him but a few representatives of that noble race.
