A Few Words to Tax-Payers.

It would be well for the tax payers to bear in mind that all property upon which the taxes remain unpaid on the 1st day of October will on that day be advertised, after which they will be subjected to an additional cost of \$3 80, for execution, probate cost and advertising, no matter how large or small may be the amount of the tax. The sheriff is necessitated to act promptly in this matter from the fact that he is required by law to make his returns in December. To do this he must advertise on the 1st of October, as he is legally compelled to give 30 days notice before the sale takes place. This will bring it to the first sale day in November, which is Saturday, the gang. RUSSELL-At his residence in this city, on the 31st of July, Mr. Daniel L. Ruseity, on the 31st of July, Mr. Daufel L. Russell, Sr.

Mr. Russell had been for many years a respected and preminent citizen of this section of North Carolina. He was born in the County of Onslow in October, 1803, and hence was near sixty eight years of age at the time of his death. He removed to the Coupty of Brunswick in the year 1810, and up to the capture of Wilmington by the Federal forces in 1865 continued to reside in that County, where he had accumulated a large property. He frequently represented the County of Brunswick in the Legislature of the State, and was for many years a leading member of the old Whig Party. For many years both before and after the war he was Chairman of the County Court of Brunswick, over which he presided with acceptability to all parties, in which position he was continued until the abolition of the County of Brunswick in the Constitutional Convention convened under the policy of President Johnson. In 1866 he was elected by the Legislature of that year one of the Council of State, and in that capacity acted as one of the Constitutional advisers of the lamented Governor Worth.

Possessed of a strong mind and unexhaustable energy he had commenced to recover from the sad calamities of war, which all had alike suffered, when he was overtaken by the lingering and distressing disease, cancer, which, after a long and painful illness, resulted in his death.
