The Excursion Yesterday. The excursionists on the steamer Waccamaw, of whom there were a large number, had, we learn, a very pleasant time yesterday, and arrived at the wharf before the threatened storm came.

Painful Accident. A colored man, while engaged in cleaning old iron on the wharf foot of Mulberry street, yesterday afternoon, made a false blow with the chisel he was using at the time, by which he nearly severed the thumb from one of his hands, making a very ugly and painful wound.

Over the River. Eagle Island, on the West side of the Cape Fear, and included within the corporate limits of the city, is growing in importance. It has just been supplied with a very respectable hand fire engine and organized a company to man the same, and how we learn that the authorities have found it expedient and proper to station a policeman (for night service) over there. Well, there is nothing like progress!

Cause of Sun-stroke. According to a late writer, sun stroke is due to the action of light upon the brain exerted through the eye, and not, as generally believed, to an elevation of temperature; and it is asserted that, if the eye be properly shaded from the glare of the sun, any extra unusual precaution in the way of protecting the head and back of the neck may be dispensed with.

An Escaped Prisoner Re-arrested. A colored man, by the name of Ben. Robinson, who was arraigned here the City Court on or about the 17th of last month, charged with disorderly conduct, but took advantage of the opportunity to escape while hunting bail, was re-arrested yesterday and sent to the Work House to serve out the sentence which the Court had imposed upon him.

Knights of Pythias. The new German Lodge of Knights of Pythias will be instituted in this city on Friday night and the officers for the ensuing term installed. This will make three Lodges of this new but rapidly spreading order in our midst. The other two Lodges already have a large membership and we have no doubt the new one will be as rapid in its growth as the others have been.

A Mad Dog Killed. Sergeant Walcott, of the police force, shot and killed a mad dog on the premises of a colored man by the name of Walker, residing on Front, between Wooster and Dawson streets, yesterday morning. The dog, which was chained inside the lot, was writhing and foaming at the mouth and his eyes presented a greenish appearance. The officer was sent for by the family, and, knowing as soon as he looked at the animal that he had been stricken by the dangerous malady, he dispatched him without ceremony.

Local News.

The tax book for 1871 will be open at the Sheriff's office on Monday next, the 14th inst., for the collection of taxes, instead of the 4th, as it erroneously appeared in the advertisement.

Citizens who are disturbed by noisy and disorderly persons, either on the streets or in houses in their vicinity, have only to apply to the city authorities, and we are assured that immediate steps will be taken to apply the needed remedy.

A terrific storm of thunder and lightning, accompanied by a heavy shower of rain, passed over this city and vicinity about 9 o'clock last evening. From every indication we expect to hear that the electric fluid did some damage in or near our city.

Quite a number of our German friends passed the afternoon very agreeably at the "Wilmington Garden" yesterday, engaged in the healthy exercise of rolling ten-pins. This is a very pleasant place to enjoy a little pleasant recreation these sultry afternoons.

Alleged Highway Robbery. A small colored girl, by the name of Millie Burr, about 14 years of age, having received the sum of \$5 75, on Tuesday, from some one who owed her that amount, was soon after accosted by one Peter Perrin, a colored sharper who had seen the money in her possession, and who finally succeeded in enticing her into the woods beyond the Southern limits of the city, where he choked and beat her until she was nearly dead and then robbed her of the money. She finally recovered sufficiently to reach home, when she made affidavit to the above facts, whereupon a warrant was issued and placed in the hands of Officer Hill, who finally succeeded in arresting the alleged offender. When taken in custody a pocket book was found on his person, containing \$3 50 in money, which the girl identified as her property. We understand, however, that Perrin says he is prepared to prove that the book is his own. He was required to give security in the sum of \$300 for his appearance before W. H. Merrick, J. P., this morning, at 10 o'clock, to undergo a preliminary examination on the charge of highway robbery.

Ready for Service. The hand engine, formerly known as "Fire King" No. 2, designed for use in the Sixth Fire District, on the West side of Cape Fear river, will, we learn, be ordered to the company organized to take her in charge this afternoon, when she will be transferred to her future quarters. Should the necessity arise, we predict that "Eagle Island Fire Company No. 1" will be found equal to the occasion.

Our city now has three good steam fire engines ready for service, with one good hand engine North of the Weldon road and one on Eagle Island.

The Mount Airy News regrets to learn that the cattle distemper is quite fatal in Surry and adjacent counties.

The Presbyterians of Goshen Congregation, Gaston county, want to secure the services of a young minister, who will devote his whole time to his charge.

The Raleigh Sentinel says: It is stated that the Cherokee Indians, in Western North Carolina, have filed a claim against the United States Government for all the lands lying between the Blue Ridge and the Cumberland mountains, and extending from Bristol south to Chattanooga. The grounds of the claim are that the chiefs did not sign the original treaty of cession.

Says the Roanoke News: John Wyatt, the father of Henry Wyatt, the first man that was killed in the late war between the North and the South, he, it will be remembered, being killed while scouting at Little Bethel—is now and has been for twelve months an inmate of the poor-house of Pitt county. Although he has lost health, property and friends, his spirit is still unbroken, and on Thursday last he went to the polls and voted for Convention.

The Charlotte Observer says: We are informed that a colored man named Irving, an Elder of New Hope Church, colored Presbyterian, of Sugar Creek congregation, voted the Conservative Ticket at Mallard Creek Precinct, in this county, on Thursday last. On Sunday he was brought up by Derrick Moore, Cupid Moore and Robert Hunter, other elders of that Church, and suspended for six months, for so voting, with the understanding that if in the meantime he does not confess he did wrong, at the expiration of the suspension, he is to be expelled.

The Newbern Times says: Yesterday a colored man complained before Justice Berry that on the night of the 27th of last month, while in a swamp in Columbus county, where he was at work, he was set upon by another colored man named Ben Sykes, who stabbed him in three places, inflicting dangerous wounds. Sykes escaped, but was shortly after apprehended by some of his fellow workmen, who proposed to take him to Flemington, the nearest town, but Sykes again managed to escape and is still at large. The injured man stated that he arrived in this city, which is his home, on last Saturday night and learned that Sykes was in the city, and he therefore desired a warrant for his arrest. The statement being sworn to a warrant was issued and placed in the hands of Deputy Sheriff Shipp. Sykes, however, had got wind of the proceedings against him, and fled the vicinity, as the closest searching failed to discover him. Sykes, we learn, is a bad man, and stands charged with more than one crime of this kind.
