Delinquent Tax-Payers.

The following communication from Sheriff Schenck is in reply to the article in our last issue under the above heading. It speaks for ed the sections referred to by the Sheriff and find them the same :

WILMINGTON, N. C., Aug. 17, 1871. Mr. W. H. Bernard, Editor Morning Star : DEAR SIR :- I have just had called to my attention an article in your paper of this date, in which it is represented that delinquent tax-payers are subject to much additional expense

in redeening property sold for taxes.

I am not the Legislature, and have no legislative powers. I am compelled under heavy penaties to execute the law, and have always endeavored to discharge the responsible duties imposed upon me, by the Revenue Laws, with as much consideration for the tax-payer as I could consistent with my oath of office, and in very many cases to my own loss. I ask that you will be kind enough to publish the 29th section of the acts of 1869-'70, entitled 'An Act to provide for the collection of taxes and an Act to raise Revenue," and in the publication state that at the session of 1870-'71, the 30th section of the amended act to provide for the collection of taxes, is word for word the same as the 29th section of the act of 1869-

If you could suggest any means that I could lawfully employ which would relieve the taxpayer, I would gladly adopt them. Your article may have the effect of drawing the subject to the attention of law makers, and they may correct the evil of which complaint is made: Should your article produce such a result, I assure you no one would be more gratified than Your obedient servant, J. W. SCHENCE, Jr.,

The following is the section we are requested

to publish: SEC. 29. If no one will bid for any piece of real property, the amount of the taxes assessed thereon and the charges of sale, the Sheriff then proceeded one mile further to Mr. shall bid off the property for the State, and upon proving the fact and tendering to the Auditor of the State a deed to the State for the property, duly registered in the County in which it lies, shall have credit for the amount of such tax and charges. The deed shall be deposited by the Auditor with the Secretary of State. The property se purchased by the State shall be under the control of the Board of Education and be held for the purposes and under the powers for which the swamp lands of the State are now held. Lands so sold may be redeemed as other lands sold for taxes are allowed to be.

On Friday last they were at the house of Mr. John McNair. On Saturday morning they called at the house of Mr. Mc-Rackan, about one mile distant from McNair's, where they had breakfast, and Patterson's, where they got dinner. In the afternoon they put in an appearance at the house of Mr. J. F. Bridgers, where several of the neighbors were collected to-gether assisting Mr. Bridgers in a job of work. Here they remained for a considerable time discussing the situation, and giving their views as to the best means of settling the quarrel between themselves and the people of the county.
