The need of a cogent and at the same time safe and cheap disinfectant is urgent. Several of those in common use are exceedingly offensive, and especially when used in residences. Chloride of lime and carbolic acid belong to this class. Their odor is almost as disagreeable as that which they are used to correct. Carbolic acid is poisonous, and therefore a danger and element. What is needed is some agent, inodorous and not poisonous, in a stronger or weaker solution, and yet powerful enough to do its work effectually. Such a one would be extensively used by families who refuse to use the others named for the reasons already stated. It is not pleasant to have poison in the house, nor is it desirable to use a disintectant that fills the air with its offensive fumes; and yet there is at this season an imperative necessity for something to deodorize our premises, and so prevent contagion and disease.

Complaints have been frequently made of late that many of the streets and lots of the city are sadly in need of a thorough cleansing. The city carts are not as prompt as formerly in removing garbage from the streets and alleys. We hope the authorities will give this matter their imthe Destroyer is at our doors.

An Old Man Kills his Wife Within Hearing of Three Children-He then Commits Salcide.

ILION, Herkimer county, N. Y., August 16 .- One of the most terrible tragedies ever enacted in Central New York occurred at East Frankfort, in this county on Monday night. A gray headed man, 64 years of age, Dyer Pangburn, murdered his wife, who was about 44 years old, in the kitchen of their own house, with heavy potato masher, literally crushing in the left side of her head so that the brain oozed out. He then went to a barn on the same premises, and deliberately hung himself. These people lived in what is known as East Frankfort, about half-way between the villages of Frankfort and Ilion. Five persons were in the housethe homicide, his victim and three of her children by a former husband. The oldest child, Mary, aged 10, went to bed with her mother in the parlor, the latter not feeling well. The other children slept mediate attention. Let us not wait until on the floor in the same room. All of them usually slept upstairs. On retiring, Mrs. Pangburn requested her husband to so. He lay down on the parlor, also, behind a door. For the particulars of the murder which followed, little Mary's statement was relied on. She is a bright, in telligent girl. All her stories, as repeated to a different persons, were consistent and straightforward.

The first she knew of the awful crime was the shrick of her mother crying "Murder, murder," from the kitchen adjoining. This cry awoke Mary. Her little sister came to her bed and said, "Dyer is kill ing ma." Mary sprang to the door and entered the kitchen. There was Pangburn standing astride of the mother, with a potato masher in his hands beating her head. Mary distinctly saw him strike two blows. When the wretch saw the children coming to the kitchen he yelled, "If you don't go back I'll give you some of the same sass." They were terribly frightened. Mary and Allie went back to bed to save their lives. They afterward heard the murderer strike four or five blows. As the clock struck 12 the mother gave her last shrick of agony. After the murder the fiend went out of the back door three or four times, for what purpose the children did not know. His awful threats kept them in the parlor, where they passed a sleepless night, not daring to go to the neighbors for assistance till 5 o'clock. They then ventured out of a window to a house a short distance across the way, and gave the alarm. The neighbors soon gathered, and search was made for the murderer. He was shortly found in the barn, suspended by the neck from a beam about six feet high. The rope was a short one, and to it was attached a strap, which was fastened to the beam. The beam was so low that in order to successfully take his own life the suicide had allowed his body to settle back on the noose, strangling himself. His feet rested on the ground The mangled corpse of the murdered woman was found in the kitchen, with only the night clothing upon it, while about the body were great pools of blood, and the walls of the room were bespatter-

ed in scores of places.

Singular Case. In April last, a man named William Mc-Kenzie, a sailor of the ship Roseneath, delivered himself up to the authorities of Halifax, saying that more than seven years previously he had murdered a man in Argyle street, Glasgow. His confession was written down and the man committed to jail. Word was then sent to Glasgow, the police authorities of which returned answer that no murder such as the man described had ever been done there.-Still the prisoner was retained, as it was the opinion of the jail physician that he was insane. Recently McKenzie had so ar improved in health that application was made for his release. The stipendiary magistrate who had received his confes-sion read it to him and questioned him upon it, he replied that he had not the slightest recollection of ever having made it, and that it was untrue, in every particular, as he had never harmed any man, and at the time the murder was alleged to have been committed was in New Zealand. Accordingly he was released.

A Rich Jewess Marries a Christian. Something of a sensation has been created in Hebrew society throughout the conntry by the claudestine marriage of a Miss Pike, of New York, a wealthy young niece of S. N. Pike, to a young Christian, son of William France, well known here. The young lady has seventy five thousand dollars in her own name. Her parents, who are very rich and occupy a high place in the Jewish upper ten of New York, had forbidden their daughter to have anything to say to France as soon as they discovered that their acquaintance, formed at school, had grown into a warm attachment. 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
