The Fever in Charleston.

As soon as information of the rumor that the yellow fever was in Charleston came to the knowledge of the authorities, yesterday morning, City Marshal Canaday, with his usual promptitude, immediately telegraphed tolMayor Pillsbury, of that city, to ascertain the facts in the case. After waiting from 7 or 8 o'clock in the morning until about 8 o'clock in the afternoon and receiving no answer, he finally telegraphed to a prominent and reliable gentleman of that city, from whom he received the following reply: "Medical opinions are divided. Think it

would be best to keep off." From the wording of the dispatch it is probable that the gentleman who forwarded it was laboring under the impression that the inquiries of the Marshal came from some individual who was contemplating a visit to the city.

From the information conveyed in the above dispatch, and from that (sfill more explicit and positive) received from another source, we think there is hardly room for a doubt that the much dreaded disease is prevailing to some extent in our sister city.

Now, while it in nowise follows, as a natural consequence, that, because the fever is in Charleston, it must necessarily be introduced into our city, yet all must see the absolute necessity of the utmost caution being exercised to prevent such a calamity. This can only be done by commencing without a moment's delay the work of purifying the city and placing it in a thorough sanitary condition, and by instituting a rigorous system of quarantine both at the entrance of the harbor and on the railroad leading to this city from that d'rection. In the work of cleaning the lots, cellars, &c., it becomes the duty of the public to cooperate with the authorities. The streets and alleys should be thoroughly cleansed and disinfectants distributed wherever practicable. Plenty of lime should be used in all the alleys, by-ways, &c., where filth usually accumulates, and all decaying vegetable matter should be promptly removed from the streets and from all private lots. "An ounce of preventive is worth a pound of cure," and if this system of purification is carried out properly and efficiently there will be no danger; for, should the discase even be introduced in jour midst and there shall be nothing like filth or impurities for it to feed upon, it will gain no footing in the community.

Prisoners for Trial in Robeson.

Sheriff McMillan, of Robeson county, arrived in this city yesterday afternoon, for the purpose of taking charge of the prisoners, Pop Oxendine and Wm. Goins, now confined in our county jail, and conveying them to Lumberton, where they are to stand their trial before the Superior Court which meets in that place next week. Pop Oxendine, it will be remembered, is implicated in some of the outrages committed in Robeson and is believed to have had some connection with the Lowrey gang. Wm. Goins is the mulatto who shot and killed one of his own color, with whom he got into a difficulty at Scuffletown some months since, and was brought here for safe keeping.


