It having been definitely ascertained that the scilow fever really exists in Charleston, and that it has been declared by the Board of Health of that city that it has assumed an cpi; demic form, Acting Mayor Chadbourn immediately set to work to call to his assistance the best medical advice he could obtain, and to secure the co-operation of prominent gentlemen of the city for the purpose of counseling together as to the best means to be adopted to place the city in a good sanitary condition, and to prevent, if possible, the introduction of the fearful disease into our midst. In pursuance of this object, he has organized an Advisory Committee, as will be seen by the annexed correspondence, said committee to perform the functions usually exercised by a regularly organized Board of Health. It is hoped that our citizens generally will cordially cooperate with them in any measures they may adopt to secure the safety of the city from the ravages of the terrible disease. About City Taxes.

There being some talk in the community that the City Clerk and Treasurer is acting prematurely in making announcement that city real and personal taxes must be paid by the 1st of September, or they will be put on the delinquent list and advertised, he requests us to copy for public information Sec. 4 of the tax ordinance, which is as follows:

SEC. 4. The Tax Collector shall, from and after the SECOND DAY of September, 1871, proceed to collect the taxes upon Real Estate, that may then be due and remaining unpaid, BY DISTRESS, AS IS PROV DED BY LAW It may be well to state that there has been no

alteration in this particular section since last year.

Necessary Precautions.

The authorities give notice in another col umn that no person arriving directly from Charleston during the prevalence of the epidemic will be allowed to stop within the corporate limits of this city, and that no person who visits Charleston from this city will be allowed to return during the continuance of the fever.
