"CHARLESTON, Aug. 29. "A few new cases reported. Three old cases have proved fatal since yesterday. Many unacclimated persons are leaving. Opinion is divided as to whether the disease will assume as epidemic form."

It seems to be a matter open for speculation as to the probable number which the author of the dispatch would denominate "a few."
