Baltimore and Wilmington. We learn that the Baltimore and Wilmington Steamship Line will soon put a new steamer on the line between the two cities. A steamer will probably be chartered for the purpose until one adapted especially to the trade can be built. The necessity for more freight room between the two ports is being felt and we are glad to hear that the want is so soon to be supplied.

Arrest of an Escaped Convict. James Jones, colored, alleged to be an escaped convict from the Wayne county Work House, where he had been sentenced to eight months hard labor for an attempt upon the life of the sheriff, was arrested in this city yesterday by Officer W. K. Stanley, of Goldsboro, aided by Constables A. V. Horrell and Jos. C. Hill. He was taken before Wm. McLaurin, J. P., who committed him to jail for safe keeping until properly demanded by the authorities of Wayne. The prisoner is said to have made his escape about three weeks ago.

Precautionary Measures. We learn that some of the physicians have expressed the opinion that it is quite as dangerous to allow the free ingress of boxes and bundles of merchandise from Charleston as to permit individuals from that city to stop here, and acting under this advice it is probable that the authorities will take steps to quarantine such articles brought by Express or otherwise as may be deemed liable to be the means of introducing the yellow fever into our midst.

From Charleston. The only intelligence received from Charleston yesterday in reference to the spread of the yellow fever in that place, is the following very indefinite dispatch from the agent of the Associated Press: "CHARLESTON, Aug. 29. 'A few new cases reported. Three old cases have proved fatal since yesterday. Many unacclimated persons are leaving. Opinion is divided as to whether the disease will assume an epidemic form.'"

Board of Health. It having been decided to have a Board of Health to look after the sanitary condition of the city, &c., we hope the necessary steps for organizing it will be taken immediately, so that there will be no stone left unturned in the work of cleansing the city and guarding the health of the people. The authorities deserve much credit for what has already been done, and we hope they will not relax their efforts as long as there is a particle of food for pestilence in the city.
