Arrest of Deserters. John Pillow and Michael Burns, two deserters from the British Brig Lochinvar, were arrested by Constable Jos. C. Hill, yesterday, on a warrant issued by Justice Edward Cantwell, at the instance of the British Consul. They were committed to jail for safe keeping, and will be taken to their ship, now lying at the mouth of the river, this morning.

St. Rev. Bishop Atkinson. The Charlotte Observer says: "This eminent divine paid his Fall visitation to St. Peter's Episcopal Church of this city on Sunday last, and preached both morning and evening sermons that for logical reasoning, general information and scriptural learning, we have never heard surpassed. At the latter service, the rite of Confirmation was administered to nine persons, five ladies and four gentlemen."

Committed for Larceny. Sharper Murphy, a well known colored boot-black, was arrested yesterday on the charge of larceny. The case was carried before W. H. Merrick, J. P., who required him to give security in the sum of \$50 for his appearance at Court, in default of which he was committed to jail.

Insanity. We learn from the Weldon News that a young man by the name of A. C. Pickrell, a nephew of Mr. John F. Ackerell, of New York, well known in this city from his connection with the late Railroad case, was on Saturday removed from Littleton to the county jail at Halifax for safe keeping, he having, for some days before that evidenced insanity of a dangerous character. On Thursday night he obtained possession of an iron bar and attacked two of the citizens of Littleton, occasioning almost serious results. The unfortunate young man is from Georgetown, D. C. His friends have been notified of his condition.

From Charleston. From the published report of the City Registrar, in the News of yesterday, we learn that there were no deaths from yellow fever for the twenty-four hours ending Tuesday last at 12 o'clock. For the week ending on Saturday last there were twenty-one deaths from the prevailing disease. The latest intelligence, however, is contained in the following press telegram, received last night, which shows an increase in the number of deaths: "CHARLESTON, Sept. 6. "There were five fever deaths reported in the past twenty-four hours. The cool weather is having an unfavorable effect on the sick, but there are hardly any new cases."

An official report is published, under date of 2nd inst., in which it is stated that only two deaths from fever had occurred at Beaufort, N. C., during that week, and there were only three cases then under treatment.
